

Rec Hall Is Key Spot In State CD Program

If a nuclear bomb fell on Pittsburgh or Philadelphia, 10,000 evacuees would arrive in Centre County, many of them to be placed in Recreation Hall, the Main Mass Care Center for Civil Defense in the county.

George S. Denithorne, director of Centre County Civil Defense, said in an interview that State College is a main evacuation center for the Central Division of Pennsylvania Civil Defense, and the University would play a large part in an emergency.

Evacuees would be housed in Rec Hall, University Food Service would aid in feeding the refugees and University communications facilities would be employed by Civil Defense workers.

Students Affected

Besides playing a direct part in Civil Defense, students would be affected by various emergency restrictions in an emergency.

For at least the first 72 hours following a disaster, no one would be allowed to use the highways out of State College.

This would mean that students could not reach home for several days. In addition, students would not be permitted to call their home towns.

Women to Relay

However, a group of women under the direction of Mrs. T. C. Benton, 226 South Barnard St., would be available to relay messages from and to students.

Denithorne said that many preparations can now be made by residence halls, fraternity houses and rooming houses.

He said that each residence hall, fraternity house and rooming house should provide for emergency supplies, such as water, flashlights, first-aid kits and battery-operated radios.

Radios Necessary

Battery-operated radios, Denithorne said, should be available so that instructions may be received in the event of a disaster. These instructions would be issued by stations in CONELRAD, the emergency communications program.

Radio station WMAJ is a CONELRAD station and would begin broadcasting Civil Defense instructions on the two CONELRAD frequencies, 640 and 1240.

Denithorne said that the country's Civil Defense program is not confined to military disasters. He said that the setup would serve in any large-scale emergency, such as blizzards, storms, floods and fires.

CD Workers to Help

He said Centre County's volunteer Civil Defense workers, each trained for his special job, would be available in any emergency.

The University has its own program, subordinate to the county unit. It is headed by Joseph In-torre, associate in charge of driver training. A future article will deal with the University's Civil Defense setup.

The purpose of Career Day is to explore the opportunities for service in the major fields of commerce, industry, labor, trade and government and to learn from leaders of American industry who have achieved high levels of responsibility, the qualities of character and education essential to successful business and public service.

Purpose of Panels

It is also intended to afford an opportunity in panel discussions to appraise the duties, obligations and responsibilities of the business community under our system of free enterprise.

Jointly conducting the panel on transportation in 205 Osmond will be Richard Spatz, commerce counsel and manager of the Traffic Section of Koppers Co. Inc.; and Lt. J. Arthur Best, of the Transportation School, Fort Eustis, Va.
