semester preceding their pledging.

Upperclassmen would be required to have a 2.0 All-University average and a 2.2 average the semester before they were pledged.

No man would be eligible for initiation until he had obtained a semester or All-University average of 2.0.

One reason for the increase in the minimum average, Hart said, is that the University has attempted to raise scholastic standards in the past few years, thus increasing its scholastic rating.

Action on the proposals were postponed until the next regular IFC meeting on March 18.

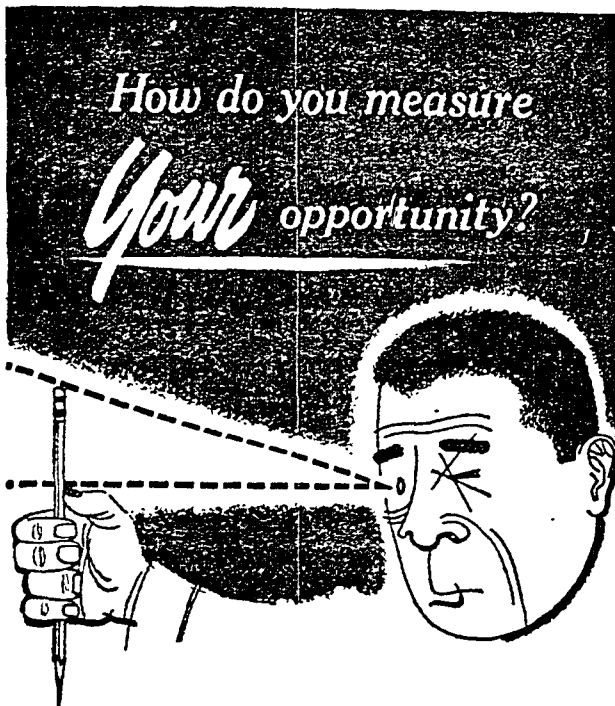

In many aspects of constitutional and judicial law, Dr. Riemer says, this sort of question arises. He cites, as examples, the entrance of religion and religious groups into political activities. Dr. Riemer asked, Are blue laws lawful? Is the banning of certain movies by religious groups lawful? Is it lawful for religious groups to influence such things as prohibition and desegregation?

Dr. Riemer added that the English and American way of dealing with such questions comes under the concept of "clear and present danger." In other words, these problems are dealt with as they come up and become timely.

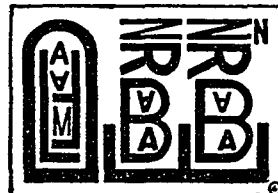
