

Landscape Maintenance To Eliminate Fall Odor

The division of landscape construction and maintenance will eliminate the fall odor around Sparks Building and the Pattee Library by spraying the trees near the end of this month to kill the notorious elm leaf beetles whose larvae are responsible for the smell.

AIM Board To Discuss Amendment

The Association of Independent Men Board of Governors will discuss an amendment to its constitution at 7 tonight in 203 Hetzel Union.

The proposed amendment calls for the deletion of a section dealing with elections to the West Halls council. According to John Rhodes, AIM secretary, this section governs the actions of only one council. Another part of the constitution forbids legislation concerning less than two councils. The amendment would remedy the conflict, Rhodes said.

The board will also discuss formation of a committee for reorganization of council structure. The reorganization would take place when new living units are constructed. Men under AIM jurisdiction would then be centered outside present council areas. The structure change would include these students.

In other business, the board will hear an Administrative assistant's report concerning the action taken by the board during the past semester.

A Spring Week committee will be appointed at the meeting.

Traffic Court Fines Eleven

A total of \$64 in fines were levied on 11 students at a meeting of Traffic Court Monday night.

Fines for parking violations amounted to \$30.

Other fines were \$4 for failing to report to the Campus Patrol office within the next complete school day and \$30 for not registering vehicles.

Automatic fines amounting to \$16 were imposed on three students, who failed to appeal their cases. Two violators were dismissed, and fines totalling \$18 were suspended unless another violation is incurred.

One student was ordered to send his car home upon incurring a total of five violations.

By killing the parent beetles now, this will be prevented next year.

To Kill Beetles

Spraying to kill the elm bark beetles, another variety of troublesome pest, will begin about March 25.

With all this spraying about to start, Trainer said, students and faculty should know a few things.

First, he said, is the problem of automobiles. He warned that if some of the oil-emulsion type liquid gets on an automobile, it should not be wiped off right away, but should be allowed to dry first. It can then be dusted off. If wiped off immediately it will smear and maybe mar the polish.

Liquid Not Dangerous
Secondly, he said, the liquid is not dangerous, and will not damage skin or clothing.

Other immediate projects of the division include the seeding of bare spots on campus lawns and continuation of the removal of shrubbery from proposed building sites.

After sweetening the soil with 230 tons of agricultural ground limestone, Trainer said, all is in readiness for seeding, except the weather. Seeding will begin as soon as the temperature is right.

He said that landscaping of the home management houses and of the Health Center will be completed this spring.
