They are Suzanne Kenner, home economics major from Greensburg, Marjorie Miller, education major from Bryn Mawr and Mary Ann Light, home economics major from Springfield.

The two runners-up for each position will be included as attendants in the Queen's court.

Final voting will be held from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. tomorrow at the WSGA polls in Atherton, McAllister, McElwain, Simmons and Thompson Halls. Women from Grange, Woman's Building and town will vote in McAllister.

Junior and sophomore attendants will also be elected in tomorrow's voting. Pictures of the May Queen and her court will be displayed in the Athletic Store window during the coming week. Indie Evaluation Plan Initiated by Leonides

Leonides Council initiated a proposed plan Monday night for evaluating the activities of independent women in Leonides affairs.

Under the plan, presented by Barbara Barniker, chairman of the point system committee, independent women will receive points for different degrees of participation. A minimum of 15 points must be obtained in order to purchase a Leonides' pin.

Rosetta Kearney, president of Leonides, spoke to the women on the present "lack of spirit" in Leonides. "We are desperately in need of women to back Leonides," she said, "and we want people we can depend on."

Under the new system independent women will receive 5 points as committee chairmen, 4 points as committee co-chairmen and 1 to 3 points as committee members. Each woman present received 1 point for attending the meeting. A cup will be awarded at the end of the year to the coed with the most points.

Leonides Council members are also included in the point plan.

Miss Kearney announced that the next mass meeting, a satire on the Academy Awards, will be held at 7 p.m. Tuesday in the Hetzel Union assembly room. The satire will be a series of

skits on recent Hollywood movies.

Among the "actors" are Lash Howes, president of the Association of Independent Men, as Artichoke in "Patience," a satire on "Baby Doll"; Samuel Valentine, captain of the 1956 football team, as Valentino in a satire on "La Strada—The Worst Foreign Movie of the Year."

Harry Martini, president of the junior class, and John Arnold, vice president of the freshman class, will appear as Henry Fonda and Mel Ferrer in "Tol Story," a take-off on "War and Peace."

Four "Leos," replicas of the Nittany Lion, will be presented to the winning skits.

The event is open to the public and admission is free. The AIM-Leonides choir will sing during intermission.

Chances on two sport shirts will be sold by members of Leonides at 10 cents each or three for 25 cents until April 6. The winner will be chosen by a drawing at the Indie Week banquet.
