

3 Will Study Dickinson's Honor Code

Three women students will leave for Dickinson College today to spend the weekend in Biddle House, the honor house of the College.

They are Janet Davidson and Mary Beveridge, representatives of the Women's Student Government Association, and Patricia Earley, reporter for The Daily Collegian.

The purpose of the trip is to investigate the possibility of setting up an honor house at the University.

The women will live in the house for a weekend to see how the systems operate.

They will leave campus at 4 p.m. today and will return Sunday afternoon. They will travel in a University station wagon.

Victoria Hann, dean of women at Dickinson College, wrote to WSGA saying that the college would be pleased to have the women as guests for the weekend. She volunteered to talk with the women and to give them any information they might need for their report.

The president of Biddle House will take the women on a tour of the house explaining the system. She will tell them how the system was instituted at Dickinson College.

The women will talk with both men and women students to find the general opinion of the student body toward the honor house.

No other plans have been made, because the women want to live in the house as if they were students living a normal weekend.

Biddle House is a residence hall housing 32 senior women. The women in the house choose to live there. Before they move in, they sign a pledge saying that they will obey the rules of the college. They are on their honor to obey the rules. There is no housemother living in Biddle House. A woman physical education instructor lives in the house, but the women enforce the rules themselves.

WSGA plans to send women to live in the honor house at Bucknell University and at other schools.

The Implementations Committee of WSGA is surveying the possibilities of the honor system. The idea was re-introduced to Senate by Marilyn Seltzer, former chairman of the committee. She gave a full report on the progress of the survey.

Caps, Gowns To Be Ordered

Students must give their hat size and leave a \$5 deposit when they place their orders.

Invitations and announcement may be purchased for 10 cents each at the Hetzel Union desk on the same days that students order caps and gowns.

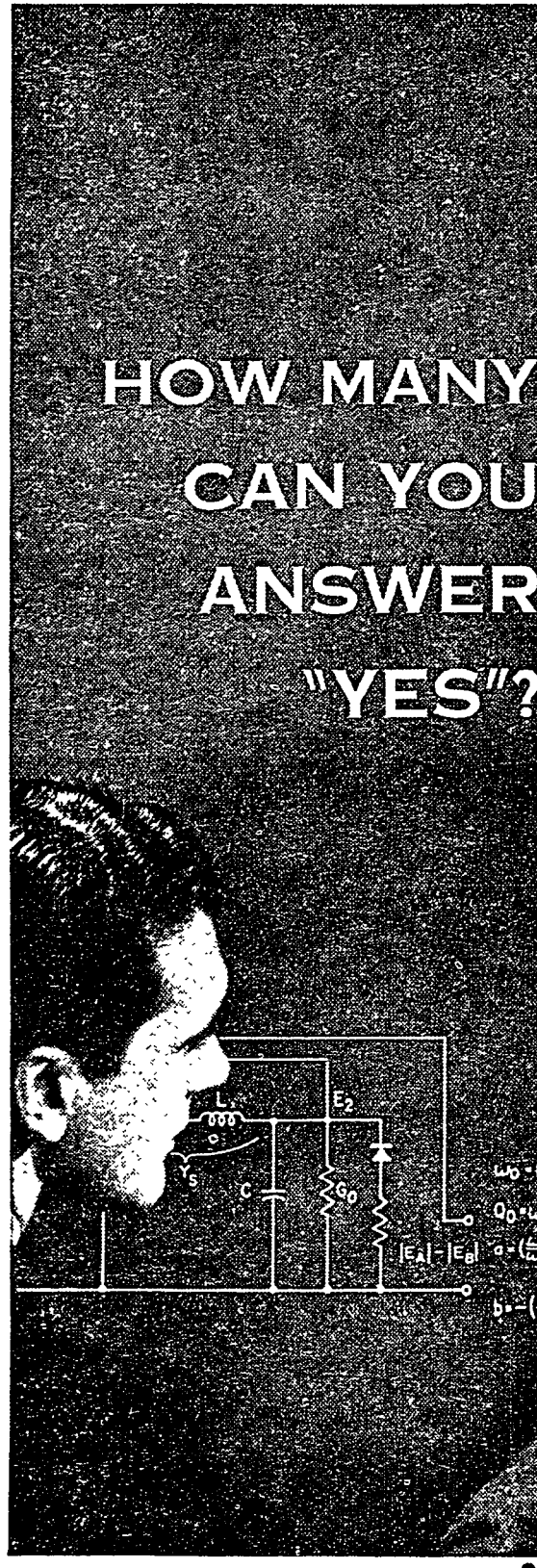
