

# Fulbright Awards Open to Applicants

Applications for university lecturing and advanced research assignments under the Fulbright Act must be filed prior to April 25, according to Robert E. Galbraith, professor of English composition and Fulbright adviser.

The awards are for the 1958-59 academic year and include assignments in Argentina, Australia, Burma, Chile, Colombia, Ecuador, India, New Zealand, Pakistan, Peru, Philippine Islands and Thailand.

Certain 1957-58 interim programs in Argentina, Israel and Turkey also are available at this time.

Applicants must be citizens of the United States and those seeking lectureships are expected to have had at least one year of college or university teaching experience.

### Must Have Ph.D.

Those applying for research awards must have a doctoral degree at the time of application or recognized standing in their professions.

Specialists in such fields as library service, social work, adult education, nursing education and museum and art gallery methods may apply for either lecturing or research awards. They will be considered eligible if they have completed their formal undergraduate and postgraduate training and have been established in their profession for several years.

### Other Grants Available

Programs for assignment in Austria, Belgium, Luxembourg, Denmark, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Israel, Italy, Japan, Netherlands, Norway, Turkey and the United Kingdom and Colonial Dependencies will be announced in June, although applications will be accepted from May 1 to October 1.

Grants for lecturing abroad under the Smith-Mundt Act program will be available in approximately 40 countries which do not participate in the Fulbright program. These countries are in Latin America, the Near East and Africa, the Far East and Europe.

More details on the programs are available from Professor Galbraith.

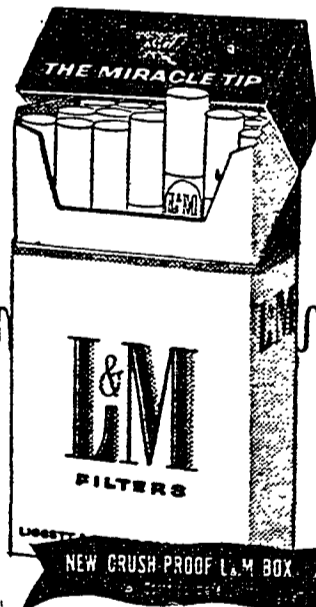
