

Walker Named Director Of Science Task Force

President Eric A. Walker has been appointed director of a task force under the National Committee for the Development of Scientists and Engineers to determine the most effective ways of making use of engineering talent.

The task force of manpower experts will visit representative areas where they will encourage the development of local "clinics." The purpose of the task force is to relieve the nation's shortage of engineers by improving use of available personnel.

Dr. Walker told a press conference at the National Science Foundation that the "clinic areas" will be selected from a tentative list which now includes Cleveland, Cincinnati, Philadelphia, York, Los Angeles, Lowell, Mass., Tulsa, Wilmington, Del., and Seattle.

The task force will work with the Engineers Joint Council, a member organization of the Committee, local engineering societies, educators, and industry in the areas to determine the most successful techniques for effective conservation of engineering manpower.

Dr. Walker said the task force will look for tested practices in recruitment of engineers and supporting personnel, and for better engineering management through job placement, work organization and additional training for increased competence.

The group will also examine effective steps to improve morale and incentives through adequate salary structure, opportunity for advancement within the engineering profession, liaison with top management and professional recognition.

Selection of the "clinic areas," Dr. Walker explained, was based on the following yardsticks:

• A well-organized group of professional engineers able to provide information on practical ex-

periences with successful programs of utilization.

• Close cooperation among management, the professions and educators in working out good utilization practices.

• Technological research and development as an important factor in the area.

A series of picture slides will be shown on the growth of the University's campus and Bernard P. Taylor, director of the Alumni Fund, will give instructions to the fund workers and hand-out their kits and material.

Refreshments will be served in the main lounge after the program.

A graduate student, in the University Hospital since he was injured in a laboratory explosion over five weeks ago, is in "very, very good condition and improving rapidly," according to superintendent Carol H. Burt.

Mrs. Burt said that Dr. Herbert R. Glenn, director of the University Health Service, is "well satisfied" with the student's condition.

The patient, Ira Starer, graduate student in chemistry from Brooklyn, N.Y., was working on the third floor in Walker Laboratories shortly after 7 p.m. Feb. 12 when an experiment he was do-

ing exploded, showering him with burning liquids.

The only other person in the laboratory at the time, Robert Etter, graduate student in chemistry from Chambersburg, swatted out the flames on Starer's clothing, extinguished the chemical fire and called for help.

Starer's clothing had been on fire from the waist down.

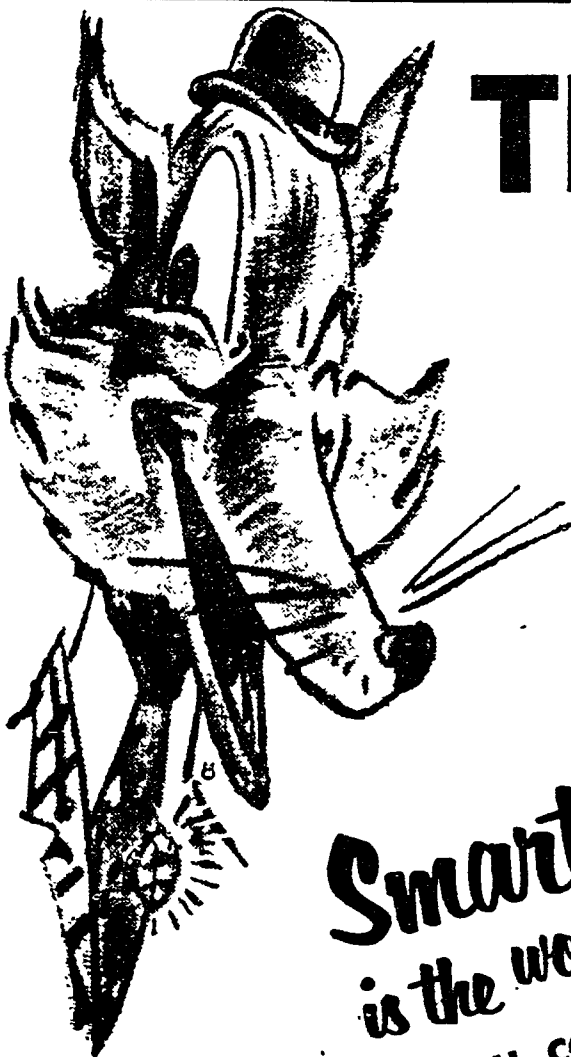
