

Application Deadline Set For Mad-Hatters Contest

Application blanks for the Spring Week Mad-Hatters Contest are due Sunday night, according to Glen Elder, chairman.

The theme of the contest, as well as the theme of Spring Week, is "Disneyland". Each group must choose one of the

three major categories for the contest which are Fantasyland, Tomorrowland and Frontierland. All points given for active participation will be based on the total per cent of participation of the combined groups. This means that the smaller as well as the larger groups will have an equal opportunity because of the percentage system.

Percentage Basis

Groups have been urged to submit names of those student teaching this semester so they will not be counted in the percentage basis. Also, names of those expected to participate should be included on the application blank. Groups entering more than the number of names submitted will be disqualified.

Hats will be judged on ease of recognition, originality, quality of workmanship and adherence to category.

Eight Spring Week points will be given for each unit hat entered and three points for each individual hat. The first place winners in each of the three cate-

gories will receive 25 Spring Week points, second place winners 16 points and third place winners 10 points. Trophies will be awarded to all nine winners.

One Entry Per Unit

Groups working together will be allowed to enter only one unit hat, to be carried by no more than six people. Individual hats are to compliment the larger hat.

Each unit and individual hat must be titled, not numbered. The unit hats must be no more than five feet high, four feet wide and six feet long. They may cost no more than \$10 to construct.

The parade will begin at 6 p.m. May 1 at Beaver field.

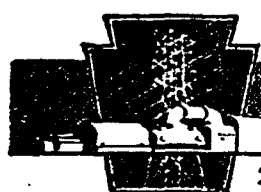
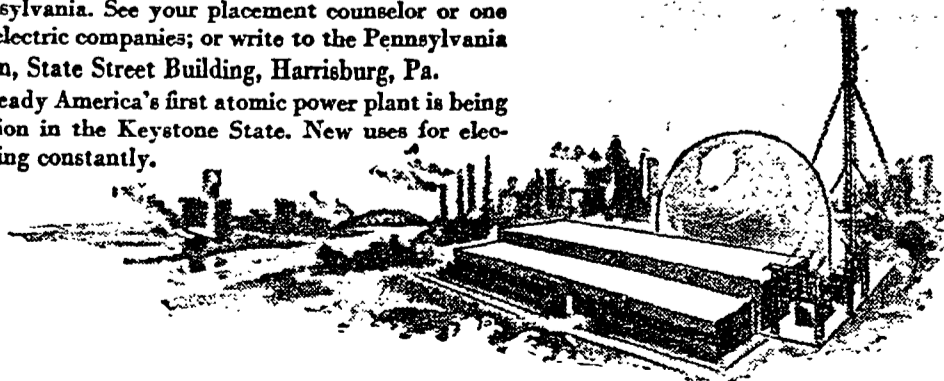
