

Seig, Stewart Cop 2d Wrestling Wins

Chi Phi's Phil Seig, last year's 175-pound wrestling champion, advanced to the quarter-finals of the 1957 mat tourney last night at Recreation Hall.

Jack Stewart, Delta Upsilon's 145-pound runner-up, copped an impressive 7-0 triumph over Theta Xi's Les Boyer. Stewart racked up a reverse, near pin, escape, predicament, and riding time to win.

Another 1956 titlist, Jim Hart of Acacia, has to wait until tonight for his scheduled 135-pound match with John Bittinger, Chi Phi. Last night's bout was postponed.

Seig gained the quarterfinals by notching a decisive fall over Lion cage star Ron Rainey, Pi Kappa Phi, in a heavyweight encounter. The Chi Phi matman led, 6-0, before nailing Rainey to the mat at 2:45.

Paul Freedel, Zeta Beta Tau, scored a thrilling pin over Gerry De Croce, Theta Kappa Phi, in a 128-pound bout. Leading, 2-0, in the second period, Freedel reversed his opponent into a body press to gain the fall just as the 4:00 whistle sounded.

Joe Bellwoar, Pi Kappa Phi, registered the fastest fall of the evening in a 135-pound scrap with ZBT's Lou Savadove. The Pi Kap grappler used an inside crotch and half-nelson to stretch Savadove at 2:11.

Alpha Zeta's Duane Tobias chalked up the most lopsided win of the night, a 13-0 runaway over Dick Barth, Theta Xi. The winning 165-pounder scored a take-down, a pair of reverses, three nearfalls, and a time advantage to account for his 13-point whitewash.

John Frey, Beta Theta Pi, hung a tight 2-0 loss on head wrestling manager Lou Camp, Alpha Tau Omega, in a 155-pound tilt. Frey engineered an escape and time advantage to eke out the win.

Independent grappler Glen Klippenstein employed an arm bar and crotch to down 145-pounder Gene Whitney at 2:25.

Another top indie match saw Ron Slimak show Al Kendall the lights at 3:15 of a heavyweight tilt.

Don Tinsman, Acacia, emerged with a default victory over Zeta Beta Tau's Jay Skolnick. The ZBT

heavyweight had a 2-1 advantage before quitting after two periods because of a slight injury.

Sigma Phi Alpha's Neil Taylor applied a cradle to Hal Lynch, Sigma Phi Epsilon, at 2:22 of a 121-pound match.

Neil Gearhart, Phi Kappa Psi 155-pounder, floored John Williams, Lambda Chi Alpha, at the 2:26 mark.

Indie 165-pounder Don Tuttle toppled Don Eckert with a half-nelson and body press at 4:40.

In other action, Lambda Chi's Dick King decisioned Harry Frey, Alpha Chi Sigma, 7-0; Ward Hill, Alpha Zeta, outwrestled Alpha Sigma Phi's Ray Euler, 6-0; and Roger Levin, Alpha Chi Sigma, shut out Don Wamsley, Sigma Alpha Epsilon, 5-0.

On the forfeit ledger, Jim Burns, Theta Xi, got the nod over Don Gordon, Sigma Pi; John Salathe, Beta Theta Pi, won from SPE's Duane Campbell; Sam Griffiths, Sigma Nu, beat Theta Delta Chi's Clare Ross; and John Rusnak, Delta Sigma Phi, gained the quarterfinals when Jerry Panati, Pi Kappa Alpha, and Clyde Ellsworth, Delta Theta Sigma, both forfeited.

Indie forfeits were won by Harry Stack, Glenn Rees, and Fred Bridge over Don Shirar.

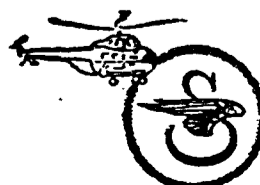
