# Yale Prof To Speak In Chapel

Dr. Liston Pope, dean of the Divinity School at Yale University, will speak at chapel services in Schwab Auditorium at 10:55 a.m. tomorrow.

Dr. Pope, a member of the central and executive committees of the World Council of Churches has been a member of the Yale Divinity School faculty since 1938. For the past eight years, he has been a Congregational delegate to the National Council of Churches.

### Directs Program

He is a director of the Rockefeller Brothers Theological Fellowships program and a trustee of the Phelps-Stokes Fund at Vassar College.

Dr. Pope is the author of "Millhands and Preachers," and is a past editor of "Labor's Relation to Church and Community." He has also been a contributor to the "Saturday Review of Literature," "Christianity and Crisis," and other journals.

### Visited Africa

In 1949, Dr. Pope was a Rosenwald Fellow and a Phelps-Stokes visitor to Africa.

His topic this Sunday will be "Jesus Took a Towel." The chapel choir, directed by Willa C. Taylor, will sing the anthem, "Lamb of God." George E. Ceiga, organist, will play as the prelude, "Bryn Calfarina from Three Preludes," by Vaughan Williams, and as the postlude, "Fugue on the Kyrie," by Francois Couperin.

# The World at a Glance

## New Mideast Threat Bared

WASHINGTON, April 5 (AP)—Israel was reported today to have told the United States that Middle East fighting may flare up again if any Suez settlement fails to lift the ban on Israeli shipping through the canal.

Diplomatic sources disclosed this as bad weather foiled an attempt by Secretary of State John Foster Dulles to fly to New York for a Middle East consultation with Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold of the United Nations.

Dulles has been personally directing negotiations with Egypt on future operation of the canal.

## British Prime Minister Tells of Defense Plan

SHEFFIELD, England, April 5 (AP)—Prime Minister Harold Macmillan said tonight Britain's newly announced nuclear-age defense plan will result in more mobile, better trained and better equipped forces.

"But all this depends upon our readiness to base ourselves upon the deterrent power of nuclear armament," Macmillan told a cutter's society.

## House Requests Budget Cut

WASHINGTON, April 5 (AP)—A 25 per cent cut in President Dwight D. Eisenhower's \$71½-million-dollar request for Commerce Department funds was recommended by the house appropriations committee today as congress continued its budget slashing drive.

## Governor Suggests Knowland Resign

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP)—Gov. Goodwin J. Knight said today it would be helpful if Sen. William F. Knowland (R-Calif.) resigned before the end of his term so that the Republican candidate for his seat could be appointed and run as the incumbent.

Asked at a news conference whether he proposed this course of action, the Republican governor said emphatically, "I'm not advocating anything."

## Soviet Atom Blasts Detected

WASHINGTON, April 5 (AP)—Soviet Russia has touched off another nuclear weapons test explosion in the midst of its warnings to America's European allies.

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
