

# Thinclads Open 'Suicide' Season In Two Weeks

A "suicide" schedule which includes such powerful track factories as Villanova, Quantico Marines, Ohio State, Michigan State, Pittsburgh, and Manhattan faces Penn State's "youthful" trackmen when they embark on the 1957 outdoor season two weeks from today.

Coach Chick Werner, entering his 24th year at the Lion helm, is not definitely set on a starting unit for his April 20 triangular engagement at Annapolis against Navy and Villanova. But it is almost certain that seniors will only dot his lineup.

This means that Werner will rely heavily on the "youth" of the team—seven juniors and five sophomores—to carry the thinclads through their tough seven-meet journey.

However, Werner has made it perfectly clear that anyone who thinks they have the ability to make the track team should try out at once.

"We feel that out of a student body of 12,000," Werner said, "there are many men who could become outstanding athletes but hesitate because they think everyone on the track team is a star or a champion.

"High school experience is an asset," Werner went on, "but it isn't necessary. Many of our best men, such as Horace Ashenfeiter, never had high school experience."

Five men are missing this year from the 1956 Track squad which lost only to the Marines in four meets. The biggest loss was that of captain Art Pollard who set a 220-yard record last year with 20.4 seconds. The Nittany ace also holds the 100-yard dash record jointly with four other former Lion trackmen.

Bruce Austin—who also set a record last year by running the 440 in 48.4—Charley Blockson, Gary Seybert and Doug Moorhead have also graduated.

Captain Rod Perry—a two time senior letterwinner—heads the parade of returning veterans. Perry, a master in the art of hurdling, may be entered in the high jump and shotput events this year.

Eight other monogram winners are back including seniors Don Woodrow, Dick Coats, and Dick Winston, and juniors Alex Mulligan, Ogie Norris, Jim Norton, Dean Rossi, and John Tullar.
