

Senate OK's Measure For Graduate Payments

The state Senate approved a bill yesterday which, if it passes the House, would authorize payment of salaries and tuition to nine University students in the graduate mental health program.

At the same time, it would deny aid to students in similar programs in five other schools.

Ex-Ed Prof Named As Trustee

Dr. Mary Jane Wyland, former education faculty member, has been named to the Board of Trustees by Gov. George M. Leader.

Gov. Leader announced the appointment yesterday and has asked for Senate confirmation.

Dr. Wyland is the first woman board member named during Leader's administration. Two others were appointed by previous governors.

Retired in 1952

Dr. Wyland retired in 1952 as professor emerita of education and served in 1954-55 as program coordinator and acting executive director of the University Christian Association.

She joined the education faculty in 1927 and served for 25 years until her retirement. Under her direction the University organized the workshop in elementary and secondary education as part of the Main Summer Session.

For many years, she was chairman of the division of secondary education and supervisor of student teaching.

Graduated in 1905

A native of Harlan, Iowa, Dr. Wyland was graduated from Grinnell College in 1905. She received a master of arts degree from Teachers College, Columbia University, and took additional graduate work at the Universities of Colorado, Wisconsin and Chicago.

Dr. Wyland was a teacher, high school principal and college instructor before becoming city superintendent of schools in Harlan in 1915, a position she held until she came to the University.

12 Will Enter Quartet Contest

Twelve fraternities and sororities will compete in the Barbershop Quartet contest at 8 tonight in Schwab Auditorium.

The contest is sponsored by Sigma Phi Alpha fraternity to aid the Muscular Dystrophy fund and promote campus barbershop singing.

Engraved bronze trophies will be presented to the first and second-place winners in both male and female groups.

Each group will be required to sing two barbershop numbers, the total time not to exceed six minutes. Judging will be based on standard barbershop rules. These rules require four part harmony and melody in second tenor. They prohibit modern chords, extended solos and musical accompaniment.

Entries will also be judged on pitch, harmony, blend and stage presence. Costumes may be worn.

Jack Kapitanoff's Collegians and the Sigma Phi Alpha Quartet will entertain but will not compete.

Fifty students at six schools, including nine at the University, are receiving benefits under the present program. The legality of the program had been contested by State Auditor Gen. Charles R. Barber, who requested investigation of the matter by Attorney Gen. Thomas D. McBride in February.

Referred to Legislature

As a result, the matter was referred to the state legislature.

Under the program, the state pays the trainee's tuition plus a weekly salary. The salary begins at \$42 for the first year, \$56.25 the second, \$62 the third and \$71.50 the fourth year.

After completion of their studies, including part-time work at state institutions, the trainees are expected to work for the state Welfare Department for a stipulated time—one calendar year for each academic year subsidized by the state.

Democrats Oppose Bill

The bill, however, is being strongly opposed by the Democratic minority. They are against restricting benefits to students at the University.

Democratic floor leader John H. Dent asked that the measure be amended to include all state-aided institutions and not just the University.

Mahany Defends Bill

Republican floor leader Rowland B. Mahany defended the measure. He explained it would prevent the welfare secretary from subsidizing students under the program in any college except state-owned colleges.
