

# BusAd Council Lists Career Day Choices

The new Business Administration Council selected Bernard Baruch, Richard M. Nixon, John F. Dulles, John Cabot Lodge Jr., George Meany and Adlai E. Stevenson as its preferences for next year's Career Day speaker.

These names must be submitted to Dean Ossian R. MacKenzie for final approval before any action can be taken.

Satisfactory arrangements must then be made with the tentative speaker, so plans are indefinite at this point.

The Council Monday night also voted to hold Career Day in the fall next year as is usually done. This year's Career Day was held in the spring semester because the speaker, Gov. George M. Leader, was involved in political activities this fall.

The Council discussed the possibilities of incorporating a new course into the College of Business Administration for the purpose of introducing students to the various phases of business administration in courses on campus and in actual practice in industry.

The plan was temporarily shelved until the faculty has a chance to arrange details such as how many hours a week it should be, how many credits it should be, what subject matter should be included and whether it should be a compulsory course.

The Council voted to have a

It also challenged the business administration faculty to a softball game sometime this spring.

Future council meetings will be held every other Monday night. At the next meeting the scholastic average requirement for council membership will be discussed and the tie between two sophomores for a seat on council will be broken.

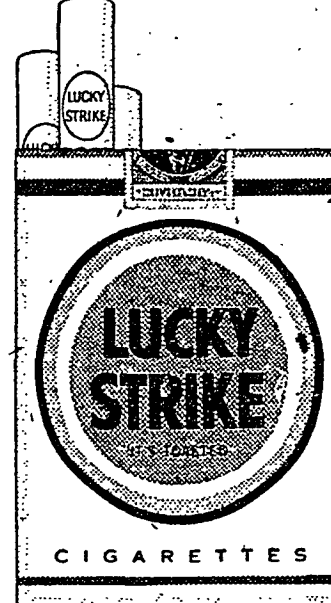
