

Chi Phi Tightens Gap in Wrestling

Last night's intramural semi-final wrestling session proved a heartbreaker for the two team leaders—Lambda Chi Alpha and Sigma Nu. Both lost two of their five wrestlers, while winning their third bout.

That gives Lambda Chi and Sigma Nu 64 points and one competitor for Friday's finals. Each has two men yet to wrestle in tonight's last semi-final session.

But a warning is in order, for the defending champions from Chi Phi picked up 11 points last night in qualifying all three of their wrestlers for the finals. They are only six points out of first place with 58.

One of the contributing factors to the Sigma Nu drop was Delta Upsilon's heavyweight Gove Elder. Elder put the finishing touches to Sigma Nu's Ben Williams at 5:35 and kept DU in contention with 55 points.

Lambda Chi's Dick King (128) ruined the championship ambitions of Sigma Nu's second semi-finalist, Bob Comfort. King was in command of the bout the whole way as he scored two takedowns, an escape and riding time in winning, 6-1.

The above was Lambda Chi's only win and "sleeper" Woody Griffith (175) supplied the lone Sigma Nu victory. Griffiths, who has two forfeits and a single decision to his credit, was a comparative unknown to the sparse crowd. But the Sigma Nu gave the audience a lot to remember as he shutout Delta Tau Delta's George Campbell, 6-0.

On the Lambda Chi loss ledger was a pin and a decision. Jack Calderone (heavyweight) was the victim of the decision. The Lion footballer lost a 3-0 verdict to last year's 175-pound champ, Phil Sieg of Chi Phi.

Sigma Phi Epsilon's Harold Lynch (121) gave Lambda Chi's Chuck Zandt the toughest ride of the night before referee Sid Noland declare a pin at 3:16.

Chi Phi's Joe Bollinger (121) cradled Beaver House's Dave Miller at 2:55 to mark up five of the defending champion's eleven points. Fred Simpson (128) gained the remaining marks on a forfeit.

Pi Kappa Phi's Bob Wenner (175) added his eighteenth point in the tournament when he pinned Alpha Zeta's Bill Eberhart at 2:23. Wenner was runner-up in the division last year.

Three of the Independent bouts provided loads of excitement with the fastest pin of the night, a reverse-loaded 7-6 win, and a referee's decision.

Scott Bomberger (Hvy.) used an effective body press on Bob Rice and referee Johnny Johnston called the pin at 1:20 of the first period.

Fred Bridge (155) and Joe Jones battled to a scoreless deadlock but referee Johnny Pepe decided in favor of Bridge. Bridge took the decision by riding Jones with a steel-gripped

Rainey Named by AP To 2d State Team Berth

High-scoring Ron Rainey was named to the Associated Press' 1957 All-Pennsylvania second basketball team, it was announced yesterday.

Sophomore Bob Edwards, who finished second to Rainey in the Lion individual scoring race, received honorable mention in the selections.

Rainey was named to the second team with 77 points. The rest of the team is composed of John Parker, Millersville State Teachers College, Al Lewis, LaSalle, Bill Blair, Geneva, and Frank Romano, Susquehanna.

Temple University's third-team All-America, Guy Rodgers, was the number one vote getter, polling 234 of a possible 285 points. Rodgers performed here at Rec

Hall this year when the Lions upset the NIT-bound Owls.

Pitt's Don Hennon, who also appeared before Lion fans, was the number two man with 189 points. Dave Ricketts, Duquesne (158), Kurt Engleburt, St. Joseph's (142), and Stu Murray, Lafayette (114) complete the first team.

The third team consists of: Joe Wallace, Kings, Bob Gall, Muhlenberg, Bob Lazar, Pitt, Bob Mantz, Lafayette, and Hal Danzig, Bucknell.

The teams were selected by the votes of 57 sports writers and radio and television sportscasters.
