

Council Will Appoint Two Ag Committees

The Agriculture Student Council has asked its president, Russell Beatty, to appoint library and driveway improvement committees.

One committee will investigate ways to improve the agriculture library and the other will see what can be done to fix the driveway behind Armsby and Weaver Buildings.

Before the council decided to appoint the committees Tuesday night, suggestions on both problems were made from the floor.

The group felt that the main difficulty in the set-up of the agriculture library was the lack of space. At the present time there are seating accommodations for 90 students and insufficient space on the open shelves for many of the books of general interest.

Other Improvements

The group also felt that the lighting and temperature could be improved. The room was said to be very cold in the winter.

The driveway behind Armsby and Weaver is filled with craters. The group suggested that the Department of Physical Plant be consulted about the cost and procedure for having the driveway fixed.

The concert will open with songs of devotion. Sandra Mayes, senior in home economics from Lemont, will sing "This Is My Father's World." Other songs in this group include "Salutation", "Praise Ye the Lord" and "Praise to the Lord."

Evelyn Tippet, sophomore in music education from Osceola Mills, and Mary Beker, freshman in education from Pittsburgh, will sing "Waters Ripple and Flow." Shirley Zampelli, sophomore in art education from Lewistown, will sing the solo for "Ride the Chariot."

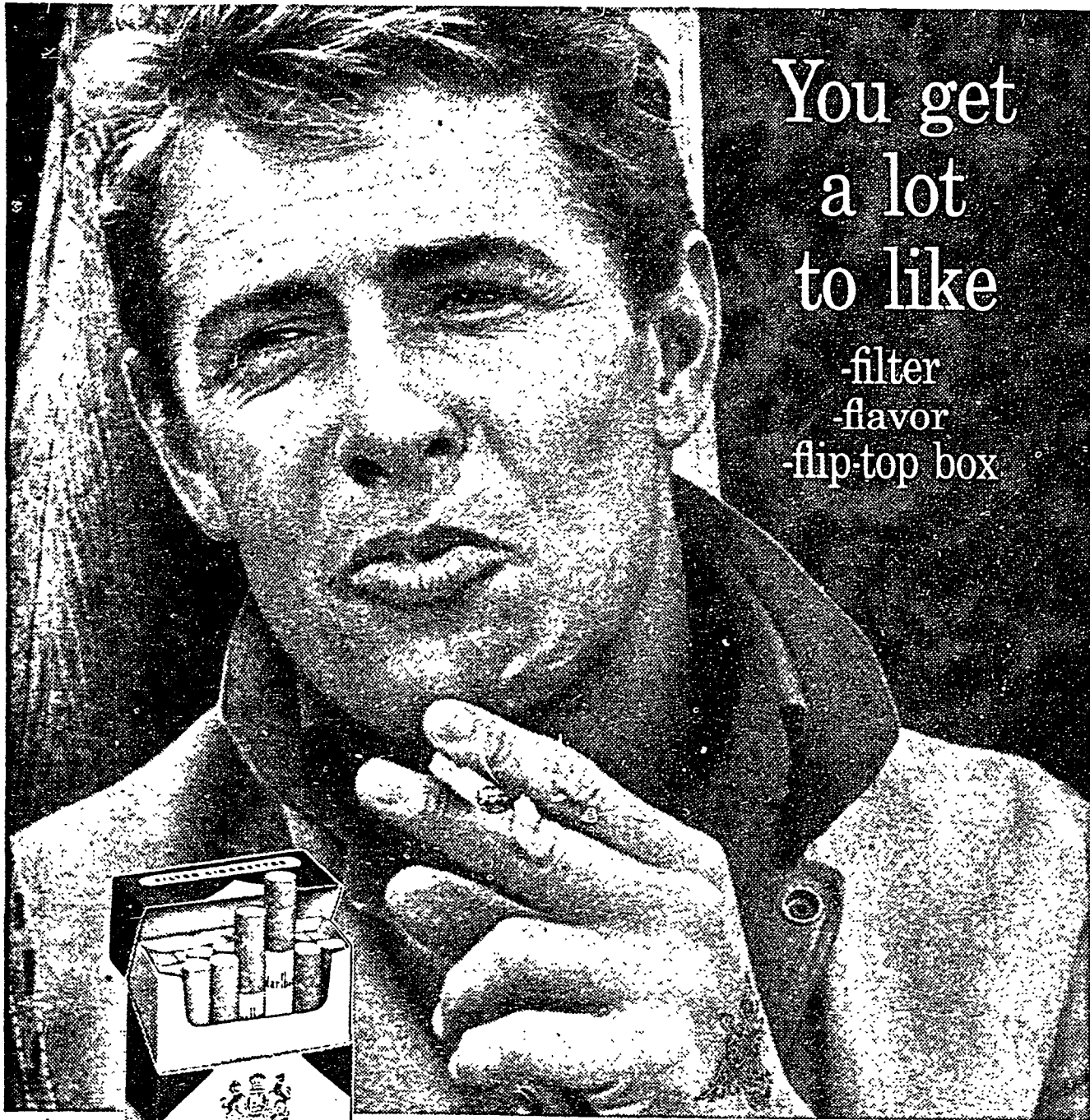
