Choir Will Give Annual Easter Chapel Service

The annual Easter Chapel Service will be presented at 10:55 a.m. tomorrow in Schwab Auditorium.

Although this is the first year the service will not be entirely musical, the program will be presented by the Chapel Choir under the direction of Willa C. Taylor.

The Rev. Luther H. Harshbarger, University chaplain, will deliver a short meditation sermon.

The service will follow the regular Sunday chapel order of service.

Anthems to be sung by the choir include: "Lift Up Your Heads, O Ye Gates" by George Frederick Handel from "The Messiah"; "O Taste and See" by Ralph Vaughn Williams; "Ave Verum Corpus" by William Byrd and "Alleluia" by Thomas Weelkes.

For the prelude, George E. Ceiga, organist, will play Heut's triumphet "Gottes Sohn" by Johann Sebastian Bach; and as the postlude, "Prelude" from Partita on the Easter Chorale by Richard Purvis.

Ag Station Opens New Lab, Farm

The University Agricultural Experiment Station has opened a new field research laboratory and demonstration farm for the southwestern part of the state.

Support for the operation of this laboratory, and about 140 acres of land between Ligonier and Stahlstown on Route 381, Westmoreland County, have been made available to the University through gifts from Mr. and Mrs. Richard K. Mellon and Mr. and Mrs. Alan M. Scaife and other Pittsburgh people.

Farm to Serve Counties
Michael A. Farrell, University vice president for research and director of the Agricultural Experiment Station, said that the research and demonstration farm will serve the agricultural needs and interests of 11 southwestern counties.

This season Farrell said that most of the work would be concerned with getting the land into tillable condition. In the beginning hay and grass will be the main crops grown on the research farm.

Farm Advisory Committee
An advisory committee of farmers from the 11 counties served by the farm will offer advice on crops and farming practices to be tested.

Projects will be directed by staff members from the Department of Agronomy. Field lab superintendent is Lewis D. Wisinger, former assistant county agricultural agent in Bedford County.

Agriculture in southwestern Pennsylvania is chiefly concerned with providing grassland and grass crops for beef and dairy cattle and sheep. Fresh vegetables and fruits are also raised.

Later research may include vegetable studies by the Department of Horticulture.

Negro spirituals, songs of devotion, a Czechoslovakian folk song and a 16th century carol will highlight the concert of the Women's Chorus which will be held at 3 p.m. tomorrow in Schwab Auditorium.

The Chorus is directed by Paul Campbell, associate professor of music. The program will be similar to that presented in a concert Sunday at the Bellefonte Junior High School.

To open the program, the Chorus will sing "Salutation" by Gaines, followed by "Praise Ye the Lord" by Saint-Saens. Sandra Mayes, senior in home economics from Lemont, will sing "This Is My Father's World," followed by "Praise to the Lord," by Kurth.

Trio Will Sing
A women's trio, composed of Elaine Gordon, freshman in business administration from Kennett Square; Mary Becker, freshman in education from Pittsburgh; and LaVerne Cowan, freshman in arts and letters from Pittsburgh, will sing "Sheep May Safely Graze" by Bach.

A 16th century carol, "Susani" by Gordon, and a Negro spiritual, "Were You There?" by Burleigh will follow.

Evelyn Tippet, sophomore in music education from Osceola Mills, and Miss Becker will be soloists for "Waters Ripple and Flow" by Deems Taylor.

The program will continue with "Flower of Dreams" by Clokey; "Music" by Klemm and "Reverie" by Debussy.

Song Dedicated to Chorus
"In June," written by Clarence Robinson, former head of the Department of Music, and dedicated to the Women's Chorus and to Raymond Brown, last year's director of the Chorus, will follow.

Closing selections of the program will be "The Little Worm" by Sachs; "Ride the Chariot" by Beatrice and Max Krone with Shirley Zampelli, sophomore in art education from Lewistown, as soloist; and "Let Not Your Song End" by Cain.

For the song, "Thumbelina," adapted from Hans Christian Anderson by Loesser, the Chorus will be assisted by an instrumental ensemble.

Final rehearsal for the concert will be held at 1 p.m. today in 117 Carnegie.
