

# Role of Educated Woman Explained for WSGA

Dr. Clara Cockerille, assistant superintendent of schools of Armstrong County, said that an educated woman is one who is concerned with and feels deeply about the people around her, not one who knows all the answers to all the questions.

She spoke at the installation ceremonies of the Women's Student Government Association Senate. The topic of the speech was "You Should Know Better—You've Been to College."

**Concerned Women Needed**  
"The world you are going out into needs concerned women," said Dr. Cockerille. "Colleges are no longer training women to do pretty little tricks such as reading poems and singing songs."

"They are now training women to live with large numbers of people, and you must learn to accept every one of these people as individuals," she said.

Dr. Cockerille advised, "Look at things well, because you get out of them what you see. If you see it big, it becomes big."

**Wrong View of College**  
"Too many women see college as big as their roommate, or as big as their sorority or as big as their diploma. These women are missing a very important part of college."

"Women will play a large part in the future of our educational

system. We have finally succeeded in making it possible for all children to attend high school. However, we are sadly lacking in the ability to send all our young people to college.

"Pennsylvania is in an especially bad position. We are twenty-fifth in the nation as to sending our high school graduates to college," Dr. Cockerille said.

**'Big Push' Coming**  
"Whether it will be possible in the future for all young people to obtain a college education or not, depends on you. You will be out in the world working and voting when we have the 'big push,'" she added.

In conclusion, Dr. Cockerille reminded the newly-installed women of the Senate, "You can doubt yourself and your ability as a leader, but you never dare doubt the women you lead. No person who doubts humanity can lead the people."

# Free X-Rays Will Be Given

A mobile X-ray unit will be on campus from April 24 to 27 to allow students to have chest X-rays taken without charge.

The unit will be located south of the University Hospital on Pollock Rd. It will be in operation from 2 p.m. April 24 to noon April 27. Hours of operation will be from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. and 2 p.m. to 6 p.m. to make the facilities available to employees of the University as well as students.

The Bureau of Tuberculosis Control, Pennsylvania Department of Health, Harrisburg, sponsors the free X-rays, which are available to anyone.

Since many employers require an X-ray report from job applicants, the mobile unit will make X-rays available for seniors.
