

Lion Golf, Tennis Teams Invade Annapolis Today

The Penn State golf team risks its perfect 5-0 slate in a match with the Navy linksmen this afternoon at Annapolis.

Lion coach Joe Boyle anticipates the toughest opponent of the season in the Middies, who have registered victories over such clubs as Dartmouth (7-0), and Princeton (4-3), while dropping a close decision to the Pitt golfers, 4-3. Penn State has not met any of these teams.

The Middies hold a 5-4 edge in nine Navy tests since 1943, but the Lions have copped wins in the last four encounters. The Penn State linksmen fired their way to a 6-1 triumph last season.

Navy Coach Bob Williams boasts tremendous depth in his 1957 unit. Among the Middies' 18-man squad are six letter-winners, four of them having two seasons of varsity experience.

Dave Wright, Paul O'Brien, Carleton King, Bill Hodge and John Davis return from last season to form the nucleus of the Navy lineup. All but O'Brien are two-year men.

The remaining two starting spots are up for grabs among letterman Tom Rosser, Vic Ripley and plebe stars Stan Legro, Henry Mauz, Hugh Rhodes, Gibby Smith and Glenn Rowland.

A surprise addition to the Middle squad is Earle Smith, 1956 football captain, who reported to the Annapolis links for the first time this spring. Williams reports him as a "good prospect."

This depth figures to stand the Middies in good stead against Boyle's linksmen and this should be Penn State's key match of the season, according to the Lion mentor. "If we can get past Navy," he said, "we shouldn't have any worries for the rest of the season."

The Lions take on Cornell and West Virginia before entering the Eastern tournament, then return to match action, facing Lehigh, Colgate, Bucknell and Pitt.

Boyle will send Pat Rielly, Johnny Boyanowski, captain John Branish, Bob Bainbridge, John Felus, Bill Davidson and either Leo Kukkola or Dave Myerson against the Navy golfers.

Kukkola and Myerson, who have divided the number seven slot in recent contests, played a practice round Monday, with the Annapolis trip at stake. The results were not announced before the team's departure at noon yesterday.

Coed Tennis Applications Due for Sports Day

A tennis tournament will be held the week of May 8 for coeds interested in representing Penn State in the spring sports day May 18 here. Three players will be selected.

Those who are interested can sign up on the bulletin board in the White Hall dance room or call Linda Quinn in 159 Atherton before May 3.

Captain Joe Eberly will make his first singles appearance of the year in the Penn State tennis lineup for when the Lions meet Navy this afternoon at Annapolis, Md.

Lion Coach Sherm Fogg, in an attempt to find a winning combination, inserted Eberly into the fifth singles spot and made three changes in the doubles lineup.

Number one man Fred Trust will team with Chuck Questa in the first doubles duo, while Eberly and Joe Galiardi will pair for the second team.

The third doubles team will be composed of Pete DeDad and Charles Bibleheimer.

Fogg was definitely not pleased with the Lions' performance in Saturday's match with Colgate and stressed conditioning in the netter's Monday and Tuesday practice sessions.

The rest of the singles entrants for the Lions finds Bibleheimer in the second spot, Galiardi in third spot, Questa in the fourth slot, and Dick Jacob in the sixth position.

Navy, who defeated the Lions 9-0 last year, enters the meet with a 7-3 record. The Middies have been beaten by only the top three schools in the Ivy League—Yale, Princeton and Harvard.

Three of Navy's top six players of last year return from the 1956 edition and the Middies are bolstered by several good sophomores prospects.

The returning veterans include John Griffiths, the number two man, Don Clark, the fourth man, and Bill Goggins.

Other holdovers returning for Coach Art Hendrix are Dick Hanson, a regular doubles player, and Bill Howard, a letter-winner.

In 1956, the Middies compiled a record of 11 wins and 2 losses. Hendrix said at the beginning of the 1957 season, "We figure to be at the same strength as last year, but our schedule will be a little tougher due to the addition of Williams and Colgate."

Griffiths, 6'4"—205 pounds, will be the number one man for the Middies. Last year he downed Lion Captain Chuck Christiansen, 5-2, 2-6, 8-6.

Against the Red Raiders of Colgate, both Griffiths and Goggins, lost their singles play matches. The number one doubles duo, Griffiths and Hanson, defeated Colgate's Leigh Strassner and Joe Abrahamson in straight sets.

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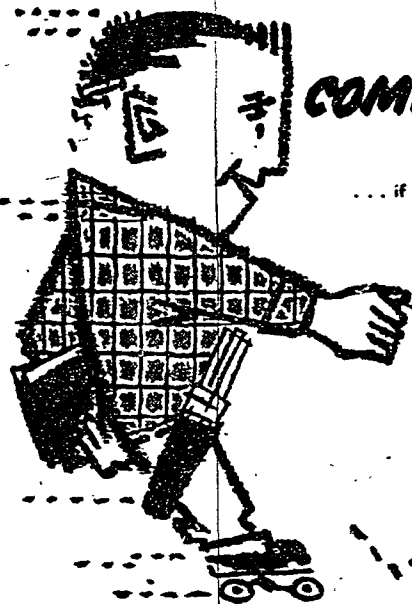
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
