The individual hats will receive three Mad-Hatters' points apiece. Points given for active participation by a group will be based percentage-wise on the total percent of participation of the combined group.
Hats will be judged on ease of recognition, originality, quality of workmanship and adherence to the category. Judges for the contest are Dr. Warren W. Hassler, Jr., instructor of history; Viktor Lowenfeld, professor of art education; Dr. Francis J. Sorauf, assistant professor of political science; Edward R. Gilkey, instructor in speech; and Lynn Christy, associate professor of English composition.
Trophies to be Awarded
Three trophies will be awarded in each category as well as Spring Week points.

The He-Man contest and the Queen of Hearts tournament will begin about 7:30 p.m., immediately following the Mad-Hatters' parade.
The first event in the He-Man contest, designed to find the most outstanding well-rounded athlete, will be the 100-yard dash. Following will be the shot-put event to be held on the practice field.
The next event will be the Queen of Hearts 50-yard dash to be run in four or five heats. The 10 best times will be chosen to run in the finals. The men's bench-press will be next, followed by the "Queens'" final race. This will be a duffle bag-clothing race. The girls will don men's shirts, slacks, shoes, socks, hats and jewelry for part of the race. Clothing will be provided by the tournament committee.

Pershing Rifles Win Top Honor In Drill Meet

Pershing Rifles, Company B, was named the outstanding company of the Fifth Regiment in the regimental drill meet held in Pittsburgh the past weekend.
