

Navy Hands Golfers First Loss, 6-1; Middies Score 8-1 Win Over Netters

For the third straight contest, the Penn State tennis team failed to win a singles match when it dropped an 8-1 decision to Navy yesterday afternoon at Annapolis, Md.

Today the Lions meet the Atlantic Coast champions, Maryland, at College Park, Md.

It was the third match in which the Lions scored its lone point in the doubles competition. Chuck Bibleheimer teamed with Pete DeDad to down Charles Baker and Jim Adkins, 3-6, 6-2, 6-3.

The Middies completely swamped the Lions in the singles play, winning all six matches, and then swept two of the three doubles matches.

In the opening singles match Navy's John Griffiths scored a decisive 6-1, 6-0 victory over the Lions' Fred Trust.

Senior Joe Galiardi moved into the second spot for the Nittanians and was defeated, 6-2, 6-1, by Bill Goggins. Captain Don Clark scored an easy 6-1, 6-2 victory over the Lion's Chuck Bibleheimer.

Chuck Questa battled the Middies' Jon Howe down to the wire in the first set before losing, 7-5. In the second set, Howe toppled the Lion's number four man, 6-2.

Navy's Marvin Osburn spoiled the singles debut of Captain Joe Eberly by posting a 6-1, 6-2 victory over the Nittany netter.

In the final singles match, which gave the Middies a shutout win, letter-winner Bill Howard defeated the Lions' Dick Jacobs, 6-4, 6-4.

After the duo of Baker and Adkins had taken a first set 6-3 win for Navy, Bibleheimer, teaming with DeDad for the first time, scored a 6-2 middle set triumph. In the deciding third set, the Lion team opened an early lead on the Middies and won the set, 6-3.

The number one Navy team, Bill Harris and Richard Johnson, posted a tight 8-6, 7-5, win over the duo of Trust and Questa in the first doubles match.

Galiardi and Eberly scored an impressive 6-2 opening set win over the Middies' Harry Rike and Guy Parsons, but dropped the next two sets, 6-2, 6-3.

Penn State's golfers suffered their first defeat of the season, dropping a 6-1 decision to the power-laden Navy linksmen at Annapolis, Md., yesterday.

Bob Bainbridge was the lone Lion to emerge victorious, copping a victory over Earle Smith, 1956 Middie football captain.

Bainbridge turned in a 68 score for the 18-hole distance. Smith, who is playing his first season on the Navy links, fired a 71, Middies highest total of the match.

Putting was the key factor in Penn State's defeat, according to Navy Coach Bob Williams. "The score was not indicative of the match's closeness," Williams said. "A couple of putts either way could have changed the outcome of the match."

Johnny Boyanowski came the closest to adding a second win to the Lion ledger. The Penn State linksmen bowed to Middie Bill Hodge, the match being decided on the 18th green.

Navy's Jack Davis, a senior, opened the action with a triumph over Lion Pat Rielly.

After Hodge nosed out Boyanowski in the second encounter, Middie Mike O'Brien, also a senior, registered a victory over John Branish, Penn State captain.

Bainbridge's win against Smith brought the score to 3-1, Navy, after four matches.

Gibby Smith, a sophomore golfer, put the contest on ice for the Middies by defeating Lion star John Felus. Smith and soph Hank Mauz were the only underclassmen in the Navy lineup.

Dave Wright, Middie captain, gave the Navy linksmen a 5-1 advantage, getting the nod over Penn State sophomore Bill Davidson.

Mauz wound up the Middie conquest with a victory over Lion Leo Kukkola.

Williams praised the Lion effort despite his club's decisive triumph. "Penn State has a very good team," the Middie mentor said.

"Navy was up for the match," he continued. "They all played their best match of the year."

KDR Bowlers Hold 1st Place In League 'A'

The Kappa Delta Rho Intramural bowlers held on to first place in fraternity League A with a 4-0 win over Sigma Alpha Mu Tuesday night at Recreation Hall.
