

Westminster to Hear Heavenly Body Pittsburgh Minister

Dr. Samuel Shoemaker, pastor of the Calvary Episcopal Church in Pittsburgh, will be the guest speaker at the Westminster Student Fellowship meeting at 6:30 p.m. tomorrow at the Presbyterian Student Center.

He will describe the "Pittsburgh Experiment", an effort at business and industrial evangelism, showing the relationship between the venture and the University community.

Chapel Sermon To Be Given On 'Following'

The Rev. A. Marshall Laverty, chaplain of Queens College in Kingston, Ontario, Canada, will speak on "Following the Crowd" at chapel services at 10:55 a.m. tomorrow in Schwab Auditorium.

The Chapel Choir, directed by Willa C. Taylor, will sing "Praise Ye the Name of the Lord" by Niklosky. Organist George E. Ciga will play as the prelude "Prelude au Kyrie" by Langlais and "Fiat Lux" by Dubois for the postlude.

Mr. Laverty was graduated from Victoria College in arts and Emanuel College in theology and was ordained to the ministry of the United Church of Canada in 1937. He was a chaplain with the Canadian Army in World War II.

In 1947 he was appointed as the first chaplain of the Queen's University, the first time a chaplain was appointed by any Canadian university.

The speaker has been president of the Association of College and University Chaplains of the United States and Canada. He has spoken at Cornell, Wells, West Point, Stanford, Hampton Institute Rollins and the University of New Hampshire. The service tomorrow will be a return engagement.

Speech Professor To Present Paper

Dr. Eugene T. McDonald, professor of speech and director of the Speech and Hearing Clinic, is presenting a paper this weekend during the annual convention of the American Association for Cleft Palate Rehabilitation in Cleveland, Ohio.

Dr. McDonald's paper deals with the relationship between age of palatal surgery and adequacy of speech.

Dr. Asa J. Berlin, assistant professor of speech, and Alvin Davis and Kay Davis, graduate students, are also attending the convention.

Psych Prof Advises Topeka Researchers

Dr. Douglas N. Jackson, assistant professor of psychology, is consulting this week at the Menninger Foundation, Topeka, Kan.

Dr. Jackson will advise members of the research department on aspects of their mental health research program.
