

Drapcho Brilliant in Relief

Lion 'Nine' Defeats Navy, 8-5, in 11th

Southpaw Ed Drapcho, working himself out of a bases-loaded, no-one-out situation in the bottom of the 10th inning, gained credit for his sixth victory of the year when the Lion baseballers went on to defeat Navy, 8-5, in 11 innings yesterday at Annapolis, Md.

Relieving starter Cal Emery in the sixth inning, Drapcho found himself in probably the tightest situation of his college pitching career when the Middies loaded the sacks with no one down in a would-be sudden-death 10th inning.

An error, a bunt single and a unsuccessful fielder's choice put Drapcho in the heart of the fire—a Navy run and the game was over.

But Drapcho, who has been bothered by control trouble all season, displayed the finest showing of heart and pitching skill of his career as he worked out of the inning with two force-outs at home plate and a strike-out of Dave Smalley—the Eastern Intercollegiate batting champion last year.

In the 11th, an error by Middle shortstop Jim Tinsley opened the doors to a Lion four-run scoring parade for the victory. Singles by Drapcho, Steve Baidy and Don Sticker were the big blows in the rally.

The loss was a tough one for Navy's Fred Anderson. Sloppy Navy fielding paved the way to Anderson's downfall as he limited the Lions to only two earned runs. He held the Lions hitless until the 10th after Ron Rainey's triple in the Lion fourth.

The Lions jumped off to a 2-0 lead in the third on solo home-runs by Emery and Bob Hoover. Navy, however, came back in their half of the inning to wipe out the Lion lead on one swing—a three-run homer by Jim Marshall. They also added another tally in the inning.

But, the Middies underwent a severe case of "erroritis" to hand Coach Joe Bedenk's club two runs and a tie ball game in the top of the fourth.

A dropped fly ball went for

three bases and Rainey followed with his triple for one run. Another dropped flyball scored Rainey with the tying marker.

From this point on, Anderson was as tough to hit as a ping-pong ball with a baseball bat and it was only because of Navy errors that the Lions put men on base.

The win boosts the Lions' undefeated skein to 11 games. Navy now sports an 11-5-1 record.

No rest is in sight for the "Bedenkmen"—they play Colgate

Friday at Colgate and meet Syracuse in a doubleheader Saturday at Syracuse.

Lion Linksmen Face Mounties, Seek 7th Victory of Season

A 6-1 season log and an unbeaten all-time mark against West Virginia are at stake today, when Joe Boyle's Lion linksmen take on the Mountaineers in a home match.

The Lions have not met the Mounties since 1942, when they came off the course with a 9-0 victory. Penn State came out on top, 6½-1½, the preceding season, and recorded a 7½-1½ triumph in the first encounter of the series in 1939.

It was uncertain at publication time whether or not the West Virginia club would bring a full 7-man squad to the University links. If the Mountaineers go with six golfers, Leo Kukkola, the Lions' number seven man, will not compete.

Boyle named Pat Rielly, Johnny Boyanowski, Bill Davidson, John Branish, Bob Bainbridge,

John Felus and Kukkola, in that order, to start against the West Virginia linksmen. Branish, team captain, snapped a 3-match losing streak in the Lions' 5-2 win over Cornell Saturday.

Felus and Boyanowski proved the difference in Penn State's nip-and-tuck conquest of the game Cornell club. They had to play extra holes before eking out match-deciding victories. Had both lost, the Big Red would have emerged victorious, 4-3.

Felus got the nod in a 19-hole battle of medalists, sinking a beautiful 12-foot putt to keep it even on the 18th green, then dumping a 10-footer to edge Cornell's Art Hemker, 1-up. Hemker, who blew a 4-foot putt on the 19th, gained consolation by taking medalist honors with a one under par 68. Felus led Lion finishers with a 69.

Boyanowski played a 23-hole nail-biter with Harry Halas of the Big Red. The Lion linksmen led, 2-up, on the front nine, but Halas got even by taking two of the next three holes. On the 23rd green, Halas conceded to Boyanowski after blasting two iron shots into a trap.
