

Spring 'Lantern' Will Go on Sale

The spring issue of the Lantern, literary magazine, will go on sale Wednesday at the Hetzel Union desk, Waring Hall, the Mall bulletin board and in front of the Corner Room. The price will be 25 cents.

Seven students will have short stories appearing in the magazine. The poems of nine students will be published. One anonymous poet submitted "Mass to Nothingness" under the name of J.D.K. Contributions for the magazines are voluntary and are not submitted in connection with any course.
