New Dorms To Revise **3** to 1 Ratio

The new women's dormitory construction which will enable the University to admit 600 additional coeds is going to wreak havoc on the 3 to 1 ratio currently existing between men and women students.

The 600 additional coeds who will be admitted this fall will raise the coed population to a new high of 3700. Men's enrollment remain at approximately 10,000.

C. O. Williams, dean of admissions, said pressure to equalize men and women's enrollment on: campus has been growing steadily stronger in recent years. The long-time campus ratio has been three men to one coed.

Applications for admission had reached 5300 by May 1, according to Dean Williams. Of this total, 2800 have already paid their enrollment deposits.

5300 Apply

Dean Williams said the University will admit about 4600 freshmen in 1957, 1600 of them

women.

However, because of limited housing on campus, 1300 of the new freshmen will be assigned to off-campus centers. Two-year undergraduate centers are now maintained at Altoona, Erie, Hazleton, Ogontz, Pottsville and the State Forestry School at Mont Alto.
