

Prof to Conduct Gold Search

Dr. Wakefield Dort, Jr., assistant professor of geology, will conduct a search this summer for a \$4 million gold placer deposit in northern Idaho.

During the past 100 years, particles of gold have been recovered from mines in gravels which fill an ancient river valley that was eroded during the Great Ice Age several thousand years ago. Dr. Dort will map this old river system under the auspices of the Idaho Bureau of Mines and Geology.

In a second project under a grant from the Geological Society of America, Dr. Dort will study areas in the northern Rocky Mountains where mountain-top glaciers existed during the Great Ice Age.

Fall Semester Assignments
Students who plan to live off-campus or in a fraternity during the spring semester should apply for a Pollock Circle assignment; only upperclassmen in this area will be released in January 1958.

Housing and food service applications for upperclasswomen, which are handled through the dean of women's office, are almost completed.

Applications for accommodations in residence halls for the 1957 summer sessions are being accepted in 102 Waring.

To Live in Hamilton
Men students applying for both housing and food service will be housed in Hamilton; those wishing only housing will be assigned to McAllister or Watts.

Women applicants for the combined housing-food services will be assigned to Thompson or McKee. Housing accommodations only will be available in Women's Building or Grange Hall.

A section of McAllister will be assigned to married couples without children. Although food service is not required under the contract in this unit, meal tickets will be obtainable.

Residence halls may be occupied between 3 and 8 p.m. the day preceding registration for each summer session.

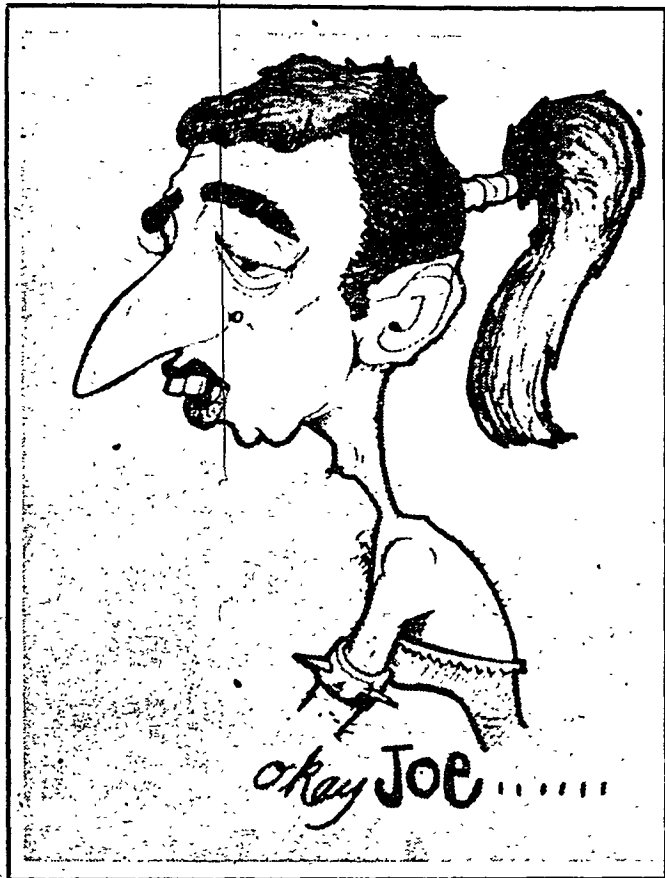
