

Ag Council To Begin Evaluation

Faculty evaluation questionnaires are being distributed this week to all students enrolled in a course in the College of Agriculture.

The purpose of the evaluation is to help the professors improve their courses and their teaching methods. Students do not sign the questionnaires and the only person who sees them is the professor of that particular course.

Questionnaire Outlined

Questions pertaining to the general organization of the course, the student's confidence in the professor, the presentation of the material and achievement in the course are included on the evaluation form.

This is the second year that such an evaluation has been used. The form was shortened, improved and presented to an executive committee of the agriculture faculty, consisting of the heads of the departments.

Unanimously Approved

They unanimously approved the revised form.

The faculty evaluation committee of the Agriculture Student Council is in charge of the project. Harry Stoner, senior in dairy science from Conestoga is chairman of the committee and Charles Carlson, sophomore in dairy science from Akeley, is assistant chairman. He will automatically become chairman next year.
