

# Bernreuter, Donkin Appointed To High Administrative Posts

McKay Donkin, special assistant to Lewis L. Strauss, chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission, has been named vice president for finance of the University.

The Board of Trustees also elected Donkin treasurer of the corporation.

Donkin will succeed to the positions now held by S. K. Hostetter, who will retire Oct. 1 with emeritus rank after serving nearly 50 years on the administrative staff of the University.

Born in Gilford, Conn., Donkin went to Texas in 1930 as an engineer and manager of the Canadian Exploration Co. Two years later, he opened his own office as a consulting petroleum engineer and geologist in Tyler, Texas, and in 1933 opened an office in Houston, Texas.

### Managed Oil Properties

Except for three years of service as a lieutenant commander in the Navy during World War II, Donkin acquired, developed, and managed oil properties, including his own, until 1950 when he left the oil business to enter government.

He served in 1950-51 as a consultant to the Research and Development Board and then joined the staff as the chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission.

Donkin qualified for the degree of petroleum engineer from the Colorado School of Mines in 1929 and also pursued graduate work at the University of Texas and Harvard University.

A year ago, Hostetter retired as comptroller of the University but, at the request of the board, agreed to continue as treasurer of the University and of the Board of Trustees for an additional year.

### Named to Staff in 1908

He was named to the University staff in 1908 as an assistant in administration and later that year was named secretary to the dean of the colleges.

He later was appointed acting financial agent and in 1910 became purchasing agent, adding also to his duties in 1923 those of manager of dormitories and dining commons.

Dr. Robert G. Bernreuter, professor of psychology and director of the Division of Counseling has been named special assistant to the President for Student Affairs.

The appointment, approved June 7 by the Board of Trustees, became effective July 7.

He will serve as liaison officer for the President on student affairs and as ex-officio chairman of the Administrative Committee on Student Affairs, assuming the duties held by Wilmer E. Kenworthy as director of Student Affairs. Kenworthy will continue as executive assistant to the President.

Bernreuter has served on the faculty of the University since 1931 when he was named assistant professor of psychology. He was promoted to associate professor in 1937 and professor of psychology in 1940 and from 1931 until last year, when he was named head of the new Division of Counseling, he was director of the Psychology Clinic.

A graduate of the College of the Pacific, Bernreuter received his doctor of philosophy degree from Stanford University. He served on the faculty of the University of Hawaii and Washington University in St. Louis, Mo., before his appointment to the University faculty.

## Atwater Will Direct UN Quaker Plans

Dr. Elton Atwater, head of the Department of Political Science, has been appointed associate director of the Quaker Program at the United Nations.

Atwater, appointed by the American Friends Service Committee of Philadelphia, has been granted a 1-year leave of absence to work for the committee and the Friends World Committee of London.

Dr. M. Nelson McGeary, professor of political science, has been appointed head of the department from Sept. 1 to June 30, 1960.

Hetzel appointed Hostetter to the new position of assistant to the President in charge of business and finance, and he continued with this title until 1950 when he was designated as comptroller.

Hostetter in 1936 was named also as acting treasurer and the following year was appointed treasurer. Since 1936, he has served as treasurer of the Board of Trustees.

# Former Washington Writer Chosen to Head Journ School

H. Eugene Goodwin, reporter and writer for the Washington Star since 1950, has assumed the duties of director of the School of Journalism.

Goodwin succeeds I. W. Cole, who resigned as director of the school to become dean of the Me-dill School of Journalism at Northwestern University.

A native of Council Bluffs, Iowa, Goodwin is a graduate of the University of Iowa with bachelor of arts and master of arts degrees. He majored in journalism and political science.

Goodwin began his journalistic career while a student at the University of Iowa as a member of the Daily Iowan staff, a correspondent for several midwestern papers, and as a newscaster and writer for the Iowa City radio station.

He served as a graduate assistant in journalism for a year at the University of Iowa before joining the staff of the Baltimore Sun as a copyreader. He then served two years with the Baltimore bureau of the Associated Press.

From 1943 to 1945, he served

with the Air Force. Goodwin will teach Journalism 13 and 1 this semester. He is a member of Omicron Delta Kappa, leadership honor society, and Sigma Delta Chi, professional journalistic society, and is accredited to the press galleries of the U.S. Senate and House.
