

# Student Encampment Suggests Investigation of AM Facilities

Second of a Series

The struggle for a student AM radio station moved from neutral into low gear at Student Encampment.

The Communications and Culture workshop recommended the All-University Cabinet committee on the AM station "make a detailed investigation of AM facilities for campus radio station WDFM, the conclusion of which must be either clearly in favor of, or opposed to, these facilities."

The recommendation went on to say if the committee arrives at a favorable conclusion, AM facilities for WDFM should be on the list of proposals for a gift from the class of 1958.

The final recommendation was a compromise between the station's opponents and proponents. Cabinet approved the appointment of a student committee to seek reallocation of the \$28,000 student press fund for a station.

The struggle for the AM station came to a standstill as the semester ended without further action.

The Encampment workshop also asked that University centers be given an opportunity to share main campus theatre, art and music presentations. Members suggested small campus groups be taken to the centers for performances.

Other action taken by the workshop included:

• Urging the initiation of a program enabling a student to study abroad for one semester.

• Urging that all campus publications become more "University community conscious."

• Proposing that Cabinet appoint a committee to work with the Committee on Inter-Religious Affairs on planning and carrying out the proposed Colloquy on Religion and the Arts.

## ROTC Students May Receive Flight Training

Flight training for selected Reserved Officers Training Corps students may be instituted here during the current year, President Eric A. Walker said yesterday.

Walker said the project as approved by the Board of Trustees was proposed by the Army and the Air Force, and the University is now seeking permission to inaugurate such a program.

**Part of Experiment**  
The training would be part of a national experiment financed with Congressional funds to pre-test senior students singled out for pilot training when they actually enter military service.

Although the exact number of trainees is not known, Air Force officials anticipate a program for anywhere from 25 to 50 young men.

**To be Maintained Privately**  
A University spokesman said the present plan was to place in private hands the responsibility of providing and maintaining the necessary facilities.

He emphasized, however, that no commitments would be made until the flight instruction was approved by the federal government.

The instruction, it was explained, would also be furnished on a contract basis.

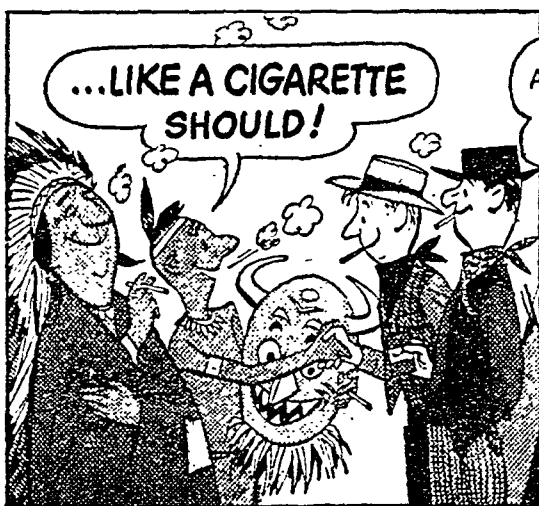
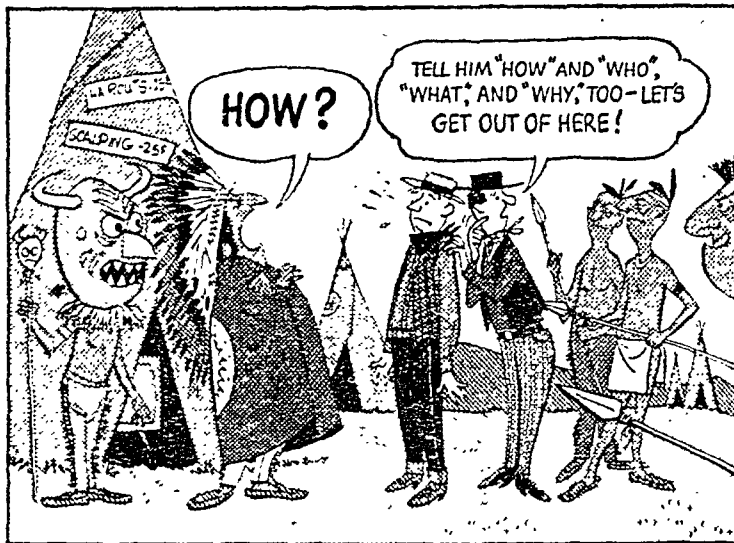
