

Death Claims 3 Professors During Summer

Three professors—Dr. Harold M. Hipsh, Richard M. Bower and Jane A. Bovie—died during the summer.

Hipsh, professor and head of the Department of Aeronautical Engineering, died May 23 at his home.

Hipsh came to the University in 1953 after serving as supervisor of a propulsion research group for Convair in Ft. Worth, Texas. He was recognized as one of the outstanding research men in the field of plane design and missiles.

Bower Died Sept. 3

Bower, assistant professor of hotel administration died Sept. 3 at Centre County Hospital, Bellefonte.

Before coming to the University in 1947, he was manager of the Hercules Country Club in Wilmington, Del., and cafeteria manager for James Lees and Sons Co., Bridgeport.

Miss Bovie, associate professor of child development and family relationships, died June 27 in Yellowstone National Park, where she was employed for the summer.

Teacher Since 1945

She had served on the faculty since 1945 and was known to many residents of the area through her work in the Home Economics Nursery School.

Prior to her appointment to the University faculty, Miss Boyle was an instructor in home economics at Bowling Green State University and earlier served as a hospital dietician in Gallipolis, Ohio, and as a home management supervisor with the Farm Security Administration in Batavia, Ohio.

The elements are of a new design manufactured by the Babcock & Wilcox Company for the Brazil reactor.

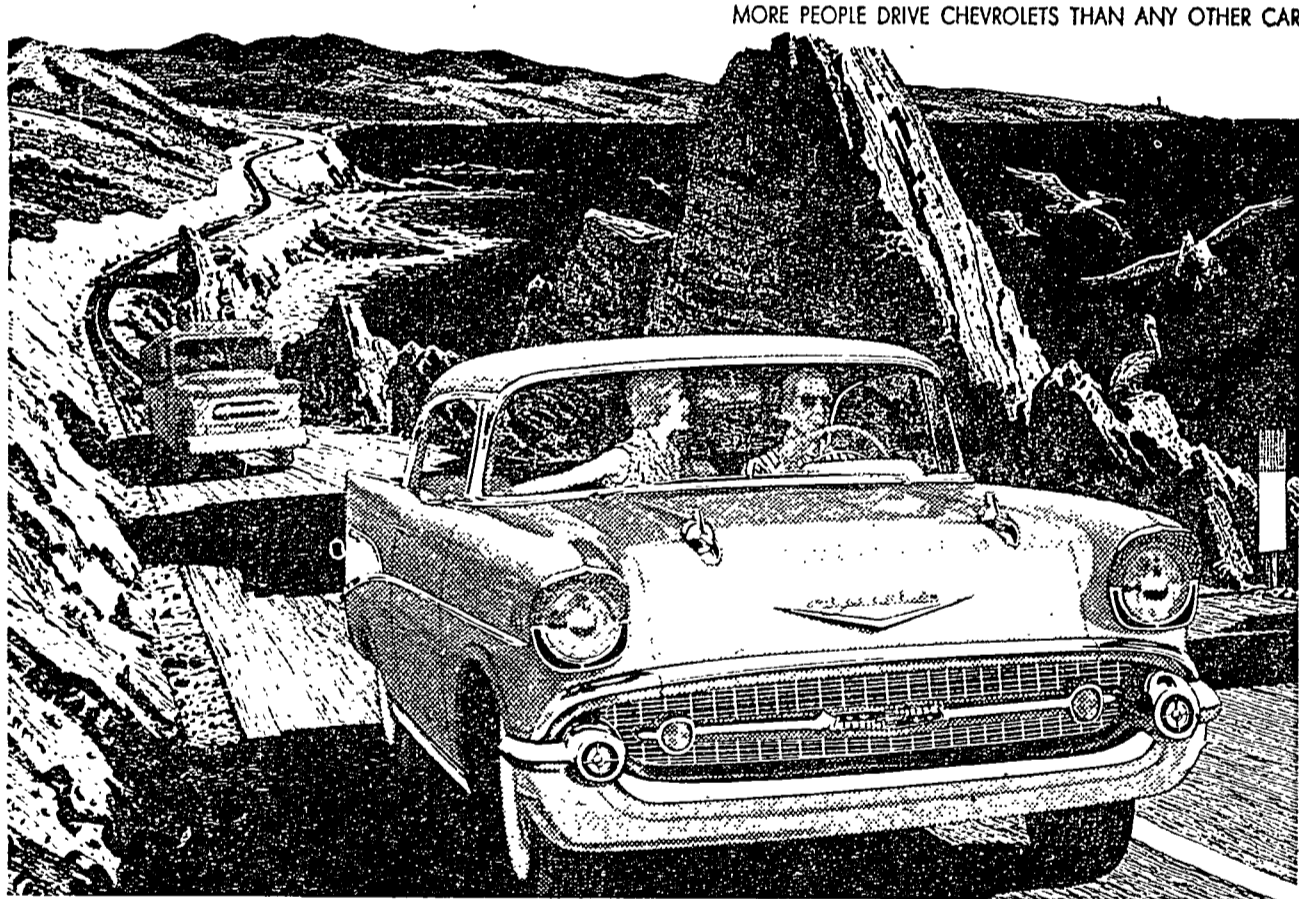
The research reactor at the University of Sao Paulo will be the first reactor built in South America and the highest powered "swimming-pool" reactor in the world at this time.
