LA Seeks Joint Group On Courses

The Liberal Arts Student Council last night voted to suggest to Dean Ben Euwema that a committee composed of college faculty and junior and senior council members be established to study required and elective courses in the curriculum.

Council members unanimously approved the motion, made on a recommendation by President Robert Nurock. Nurock said he believes a better academic atmosphere could be established through such a cooperative effort by faculty and students.

A committee to investigate the possibility of a Liberal Arts Career Day was chosen. Members are Sandra Gusky, James Ferraro, Jay Feldstein, Lynn Ward, Barbara Stone and Richard Friedman.

The council also set up a committee to investigate the possibility of awarding one or more Liberal Arts scholarships on a continuing basis. The committee was established after Nurock read a letter by Richard C. Maloney, assistant dean of the college, which pointed out certain defects of the present scholarship plan.

Other committees appointed were: Elections committee: Louis Phillips, David Epstein, Lawrence Brody, Marilyn Elias, Joyce Basch, Patricia O'Neill and William Jaffe; Academic Honesty committee: Lynn Ward and Leonard Julius.

Investigation On Parking To Continue

The University parking and traffic survey will run further counts on parking facilities before the final report is submitted. Calvin G. Reen, director of the survey, yesterday said the information gathered from aerial photographs taken last spring was insufficient for purposes of the survey.

A preliminary report was submitted to the administration early this fall. Ossian R. McKenzie, vice president in charge of business administration, and Walter H. Wiegand, director of physical plant, said the report mainly was concerned with areas of study rather than specific solutions.

They declined to comment further on the report's contents. The main work of the survey was completed last May. Students and employees of the department of the physical plant, under the supervision of staff members of the Department of Civil Engineering, participated in the tabulations.

In addition, automatic traffic counting machines, lent by the State Department of Highways, aided in the counts. These machines, stationed at 14 positions around campus, were in operation for one week.

Both pedestrian and vehicular traffic were included in the counts.

The photos, taken prior to the other tabulations, gave an estimate of the utilization of existing facilities. They were taken on an hourly basis to determine the time taken to fill spaces and the amount of waiting occurring by drivers desiring to park their vehicles.

These photos also gave an overall view of traffic conditions during the day.

Reen, who is professor of civil engineering said he could set no date for the submission of the final report.

Carnahan Named ChemEng Head

The remaining half of the proceeds will be used for the fraternity's service welfare program which, in the past, has included CARE, Campus Chest, an Easter egg hunt in Woodycrest, the Alpha Phi Omega Scholarship Fund and the Beaver Dam project.

Proceeds from last year's Ugly Man Contest totaled about \$650. This year's proceeds are expected to be much greater due to better organization and the movement of the contest from the spring to the fall semester, according to co-chairman Wayne Lippman.

Approximately \$32,000 of the \$250,000 goal set for the Stone Valley project has already been realized by the project committee.

Ernest B. McCoy, chairman of the Stone Valley Recreation Lake Development committee yesterday said the committee was very appreciative of the contribution Alpha Phi Omega will be making. APhiO's donation will go toward the general project fund.

McCoy also said about \$4500 has already been spent on winterizing the civil engineering camp on the Stone Valley site.

He said the Forestry cabin and similar camps will be winterized soon for student use during the week and weekends.

Plans are being made for the construction of a dam on Shaver Creek in Stone Valley to provide a lake that would be the center of a large recreation area. The site chosen is a 6000 acre tract that the University now owns and uses for instructional and research purposes.

Harris Awarded Honorary Office

Dr. Brice Harris, professor of English literature, has been named honorary president of the Pennsylvania Council of Teachers of English.

Harris was instrumental in organizing the Pennsylvania Council, an affiliate of the National Council of Teachers of English, which was formed to strengthen the English program on all levels so that the needs of Pennsylvania students may be met most effectively.

J. Stanley Cook, associate professor of English, was named by the Board of Directors to represent the group at the National Council's annual meeting Nov. 28 to 30 in Minneapolis.

Hort Prof Will Teach At Wisconsin University

Dr. John R. Bracken, who will retire Oct. 1 as professor emeritus of landscape architecture, has accepted an appointment to teach at the University of Wisconsin.

His duties will consist of teaching activities similar to those in which he was active at the University. He had served on the faculty since 1926.

Workshop Suggests Cabinet Evaluation

"A committee appointed by All-University Cabinet and made up of non-Cabinet members should be established to evaluate the re-distribution of Cabinet seats."

This recommendation was drawn up at Student Encampment by the Student Government workshop and approved by Encampment participants at the final plenary session.

Accompanying the recommendation was a suggestion that Cabinet membership could be established so that the student would be represented in a three-fold manner:

• University-wide affiliation—All-University student officers and officers of the four classes.

• College affiliation—student councils.

• Living unit affiliation—Association of Independent Men, Town Independent Men, Interfraternity Council, Women's Student Government Association, Panhellenic Council and Leontides.

Concerning the realm of student politics, the workshop went on record as opposed to the policy of requiring candidates to pay their own campaign fees. Along the same line, the workshop recommended that the present election code provision on rotation of offices between fraternity and independent men be investigated and evaluated.

The workshop report was amended at the plenary session to include the following recommendations:

• That Cabinet coordinate a brochure stating the past history and accomplishments of student government at the University.

• That Cabinet include a historian in the list of Cabinet offices.

The workshop also proposed a new judicial system: a single judicial body to enforce University and Cabinet regulations on student behavior. Under this system subordinate judicial bodies would be set up concerning regulations of WSGA, AIM, IFC, Panhel, dormitory councils, and other self governing bodies affecting groups rather than the total student body.

Another recommendation was that a committee on student welfare be established by Cabinet. This committee would deal specifically with housing, food and health facilities and would cooperate with the committees of the faculty and administration on student affairs and welfare.
