

Approval Given By Ag Faculty For 7 Projects

The faculty of the College of Agriculture has approved seven research projects to be undertaken by the departments this year.

They involve: The relationship between the quantity and quality of dietary protein and their effects on the energy metabolism of humans; improvement of market procedures and outlets for Pennsylvania livestock; the relative importance of root, crown and foliar diseases of red clover in the state.

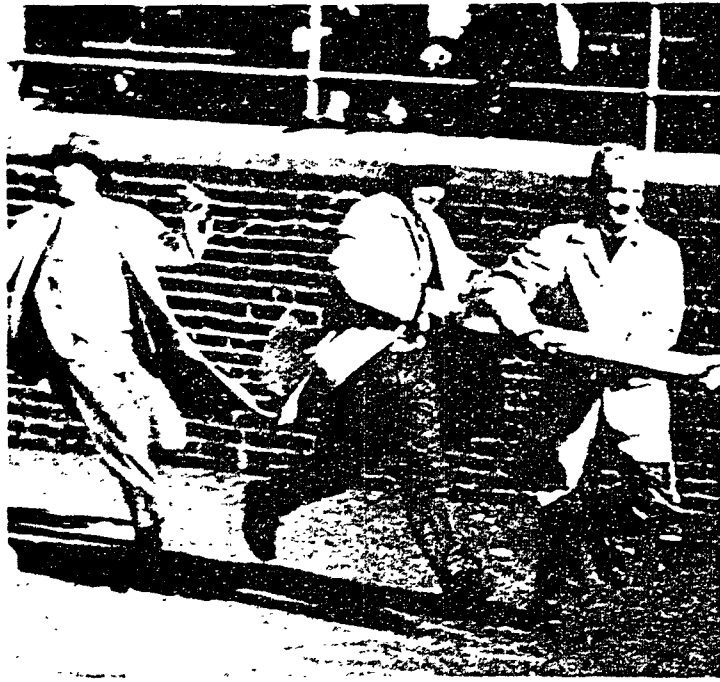
The influence of pesticides on the flavor of fruits and vegetables; the relationship of microorganisms to soil phosphorus; financial management practices of dairy farmers in the limestone valleys of Pennsylvania and a study of the relationship of microorganisms in the family Enterobacteriaceae.

The projects, financed by local, state and federal agency funds, will take from three to five years for completion.
