# Record Set For Rushing Registration

More coeds have registered for this informal rushing period than have registered for any other rushing period, according to Mrs. R. Mae Schultz, assistant dean of women.

A total of 425 coeds have registered. Last semester less than 300 coeds signed up for formal rushing. A year ago 277 coeds registered for informal rushing.

Informal rushing will begin Monday and will end Nov. 1. Rushing will be held from 1:30 to 5 p.m. and 6:30 to 8 p.m. Mondays through Thursdays and from 1:30 to 5 p.m. on Fridays.

Invitations from a sorority to a coed will be distributed after 6:30 p.m. tomorrow. The invitations will be slipped under the coeds' doors.

Coeds are to return their answers to the invitations before noon Monday to 105 Old Main. Sororities may pick up the answers from 1 to 1:30 p.m. and 4 to 4:30 p.m. Monday at 105 Old Main. Bids may not be sent out before 8 a.m. Oct. 16. Bids may be given to a rushee after she has been to a sorority three times, not including open houses.

A rushee must return her answer to a bid to 105 Old Main within three days after receiving it.

Dress for informal rushing will be casual — socks, skirts and sweaters.

Four councils—Mineral Industries, Engineering-Architecture, Physical Education and Athletics, and Agriculture—will hold elections during the week of Oct. 28 in classes attended by freshmen in each college.

Members of ICCB will meet with students in the Division of Counseling at 7 p.m. Tuesday in Schwab Auditorium to acquaint the students with a proposal to organize a DOC student council.

ICCB defeated on Thursday two motions to donate funds to Circa, literary magazine slated to replace the Lantern.

Robert Nurock, Circa editor and president of the Liberal Arts Student Council, asked for a \$500 donation from ICCB. A motion to this effect and a subsequent motion asking for \$300 were defeated after Carroll McDonnell, Chemistry-Physics Student Council president, told ICCB his council started the semester with a \$160 debt.

James Stratton, ICCB president, mentioned the possibility of setting up loans to councils in financial difficulties from other councils with sufficient funds.

# ROTC Rifle Team Manager Wounded in Pistol Accident

The manager of the Army Reserve Officers Training Corps rifle team was slightly wounded Thursday night when a .22 calibre target pistol accidentally discharged in his hand.

Glenn Benham, junior in electrical engineering, sustained a superficial wound of the right hand when he was removing the pistol from the firing line.

Benham was treated in the University Hospital by Dr. Mary Helz. He remained overnight in the infirmary because of slight shock.

Col. Arthur W. Kogstad, of the Army ROTC, said Benham apparently picked up the pistol by the barrel and it accidentally discharged as he was clearing it with his right hand. The bullet grazed his hand.

Benham is an advanced Army ROTC student.

# Officials Expect Parking Jam At Army Game

Parking space for tomorrow's Army-Penn State game is expected to be a big problem with a record crowd predicted to attend.

University officials have suggested that students and State College residents walk rather than drive to the game.

The parking problem is particularly bad this year since several of the parking areas are not available due to construction on campus.

The area bordering the southern end of the golf course will not be available since construction is under way for the addition to Foods Stores Building. The large plot along Park Avenue from Hort Woods to Shortlidge Road is also unavailable since the entire area is being excavated for the new men's residence halls.

The grass-covered area between Forestry Building and the Extension Conference Center will be opened for parking. This area will also be closed in the future when construction begins on a new petroleum refining laboratory.
