

# Harshbarger Discusses Fear of Russian Satellite

Dr. Luther H. Harshbarger, University chaplain, Sunday said "a nation has never been so powerful, yet so scared" as the United States is now.

Harshbarger, referring to the new era of science begun with the Russian launching of the satellite Sputnik, said,

"However cosmic the world may be, everything depends upon the individual in the last analysis."

He said: "We must have faith especially now in this new era of science where we think we do not count. People who do not count never do anything that counts."

"We must learn to make decisions and we can do this by facing the future in the light of the past. We need to discover for ourselves our place in American history."

Harshbarger said ministers in Little Rock now are asking the people to pray for God's help.

"It is a little late now, and why ask God for help with something which man can decide rightly for himself?" he suggested. Man was created intelligently to do so.

He said, "We have to find the full meaning of America for ourselves and for others. We should look at the people in history as living beings, as our fathers, not as abstract data. It is our history."

When Columbus' ships bumped into the New World, it was a physical discovery, he said, and that was only the beginning. He also bumped against new ideas. We are still a part of this discovery, he said.

The Harrisburg meeting will be held to discuss the possibility of a center to offer courses by Elizabethtown College, Dickinson College, Temple University, Lebanon Valley College and the University.

# Fans, Gillespie 'Shook Up' Over Jazz Concert Mix-Up

Dizzy was "all shook up over this." So were several hundred jazz fans when Dizzy Gillespie and his 18-piece band failed to show up for a concert scheduled

for 2:30 p.m. in Recreation Hall. Dizzy finally did appear—at 7:10 p.m.

The alternate star, saxophonist Sonny Stitt, also failed to show up for the concert. He called from Harrisburg to report a flat tire and did not arrive until 5:30 p.m.

Jazz Club officers, however, heard nothing from Dizzy. At 7:10 p.m. Barney Byram, club president, and Theodore D. Richards, adviser, discovered the band bus at the intersection of Burrows and Pollock roads.

They said Gillespie apparently was late because of a booking error in New York City. The band had expected to play the concert at 8:30 p.m. in Rec Hall.

Club officers last night said they would confer with a lawyer to check on what can be done about the violated contract.

Refunds were made Sunday afternoon in Rec Hall to out-of-town ticket holders. Students and townspeople can get their full refund by presenting their ticket stubs at the Hetzel Union desk this week.
