

LA Council Hears Greek Voting Plan

The Liberal Arts Student Council constitutional revision committee last night presented a revised article which stipulates that, in the election of officers, members of any social fraternity, social professional fraternity or sorority shall split one vote equally among its members present.

The council will vote on the constitution next week. More than one-half of the members were absent.

Other additions or changes to the constitution are:

•Members shall have an All-University average of 2.4 instead of 2.5.

•The Council shall consist of 7 freshmen (instead of 6), 8 sophomores, 10 juniors (instead of 11) and 7 seniors.

•The office of treasurer shall be added to the executive committee of the council.

The following functions of the council were added to the constitution:

•"To promote greater student responsibility and awareness toward the faculty and administrative policies of the College of the Liberal Arts and of the University.

•"To represent the views of the Liberal Arts students before the faculty, administration and student government through All-University Cabinet and the Inter-College Council Board.

•"To provide for all other matters pertaining to the welfare of the students of the College of the Liberal Arts and to take any other action which it may deem necessary or appropriate."

The council voted to award a \$100 scholarship to aid a deserving student in the College of the Liberal Arts. The student will receive \$50 in the fall semester and \$50 in the spring semester.

To qualify, a student must have completed his fifth semester and must have an All-University average of 2.5. Applicants will be judged on need and service to the college and University.

The recipient will be selected by the University Coordinator of Scholarships.

President Robert Nurock said council elections will be held Oct. 30-31. Preliminary nominations will be held Oct. 21-26.
