

Cabinet Will Pay Costs Of Encampment Accident

All-University Cabinet last night voted unanimously to appropriate \$500.85 to pay the costs of an accident involving a University station wagon during student encampment.

Gerald Carlson, encampment business manager, was slightly injured while using the vehicle on an errand to buy supplies. The station wagon went off the road and crashed into a tree.

Cabinet was told that Carlson's accident was not covered by the University's insurance policy because the vehicle had not been issued in his name. The student authorized to drive it was Harry Martini, chairman of the Encampment Committee. Martini had asked Carlson to use the station wagon for the errand.

Seven members of Cabinet were absent from the meeting. Several were reported suffering from flu and other respiratory diseases.

Absent were: Joseph Boehret, All-University secretary-treasurer; James Hart, Interfraternity Council president; James Stratton, president of the Mineral Industries Student Council; Patricia Moran, president of the Home Economics Student Council; Jere Fridy, president of the Board of Dramatics and Forensics; George Smith, president of the Freshman Class; and John Sopko, president of the Sophomore Class.

Cabinet approved the Student Encampment Academic Policies Workshop report, presented by Grace Antes, president of the Panhellenic Council and a member of the workshop.

The report dealt with the determination of administrative policies, liberalization versus specialization, the trimester and quarterly system, community living, an honors program, and University centers.

A report from the Orientation, Tradition and School Spirit Workshop, originally scheduled to be given last night, was postponed.

Cabinet unanimously approved a list of about 50 students to receive complimentary tickets to the Junior Prom. The list was proposed by the prom committee.

IFC Contest Will Go On Despite Flu

Fraternity lawn displays will be judged as scheduled between 7 and 9 tonight, despite cancellations of displays by some fraternities because of illness.

The deadline for registration for the display contest has been extended to noon today. Registrations should be filed at the Hetzel Union desk.

Twenty-three fraternities had registered for the contest by last night.

Leonard Sichel, vice president of the Interfraternity Council, said yesterday he expects "at least half" of the fraternities to have displays.

A spot check of fraternities last night revealed that 10 houses out of 19 contacted had either cancelled their lawn displays or listed them as "doubtful."

The winners of the contest will be decided tonight by a panel. Members are Richard C. Maloney, assistant dean of the College of the Liberal Arts; Otto E. Mueller, director of housing, and Mrs. R. Mae Schultz, assistant to the dean of women.

The theme of the display is "Penn State vs. Vanderbilt." The Nittany Lions play Vanderbilt tomorrow at Beaver Field.

The first place winner will receive the Alumni Association Trophy and five points toward the outstanding fraternity award. The second place fraternity will receive three points, and the third place winner, one point.

Three other displays will receive honorable mention awards of 25 points each.

Judging will be on the basis of originality, craftsmanship, and adherence to the theme.

"The Carnival of Thieves," the first 1957-58 Center Stage production of the Penn State Players, will open at 8 tonight at the Extension Conference Center.

The show also will be presented Saturday night and six successive weekends afterwards.

The play, written by Jean Anouilh, centers around three whimsical, good-natured pickpockets, Gustave, Hector and Peterbono, who become entangled with a wealthy dowager, Lady Hurf, and her two nieces.

The play reaches its peak of farcical comedy at the height of the carnival season when Gustave, Hector and Peterbono pose as Spanish noblemen and further entangle themselves and the plot.

Richard Mazza plays Gustave; John Timmis, Hector; and Joseph Servello, Peterbono. Fred Mayers is cast in the role of Dupont-Dufort Jr. and Marvin Katz will be Dupont-Dufort Sr. Gardner Tillson will play Edgar; Rosemary Keating, Eva; Christina Chesney, Juliette; Mary Minkiewicz, Lady Hurf; William Bonham, town crier and June McCurdy, nursemaid.

Joseph Monaco is stage manager. The show is directed by Kelly Yeaton.
