

# Hort Club Readies Pavilion for Show

The Stock Pavilion is swiftly being transformed into an old English countryside by members of the Horticulture Club for the 44th annual Horticulture Show which will be held from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. tomorrow and from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. Sunday.

The old English countryside will be depicted by a thatched roof cottage, a wishing well and a rustic bridge. Features such as a sunken pool, a rock garden and a stream with a waterfall will carry out the theme, adding to the natural effect of the autumn scene.

An old English countryside would not be complete without a rustic tavern, so the Lion's Head Tavern, where cider and apples will be on sale, is being constructed at the far end of the pavilion.

Flower gardens dotting the countryside will be composed of more than 1500 potted plants, including chrysanthemums, begonias and geraniums.

The show is dedicated to Lawrence D. Little, former assistant professor of ornamentals and former adviser to the Horticulture Club. Little now is with the Agriculture Extension Service at Rutgers University. The formal dedication will be made at 10 a.m. Sunday in the seminar room of Tyson Hall.

A dedication booth and a booth with a display by Pi Alpha Xi, national floriculture honorary so-

ciety, will flank the entrance of the pavilion. A viewing stand will be set up on the right side of the pavilion so that spectators may have an overall view of the show. An exchange exhibit from the Horticulture Club at Purdue University will display 20 varieties of apples.

The club will send corsages and boutonnieres to the President's party and to the J. L. Mauthe party in the press box for the football game. Mauthe, captain of the first unbeaten and untied football team, will have his name formally placed in the Football Hall of Fame tomorrow. Several bushels of apples also will be sent to the press box.

Richard Craig, junior in horticulture from Pittsburgh, is manager of the show, Delano Muse, senior in horticulture from Allentown, is assistant manager. John Sabak, junior in landscape architecture from McKeesport, designed the show.

Dr. Loren D. Tukey, associate professor of pomology, and Dr. Darrell E. Walker, assistant professor of plant breeding, are advisers to the club.

## Boro Suggests Additional Zone For Parking

State College Traffic Commission recommended last night that 2-hour parking be allowed on the north side of East College Avenue between Heister Street and Locust Lane.

This area is presently a no parking zone, although borough ordinances permit 2-hour parking. Parking was prohibited there by special order of Burgess Claude H. Decker.


In moving the recommendation, Eugene M. Fulmer, executive secretary of the State College Area Chamber of Commerce, specified that a buffer zone of "not less than 25 feet and not more than 30 feet" be provided west of Heister Street.

According to present plans, if the two hour parking is abused, meters will be installed.
