

# Contestants Prepare For 'Ugly Parade'

The "uglies" on campus and their sponsoring fraternity and independent groups are making final preparations for the Ugly Man contest, which starts Tuesday and ends Friday.

Pictures of the ugly men in their full contest costumes will be on display Tuesday morning at the Ugly Man voting booth on the Mall at Pollock Road. Voting in the contest, sponsored by Alpha Phi Omega men's national service fraternity, will be held from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday through Thursday.

Students may vote for contestants by placing pennies in jars under the contestants' pictures. Each penny will count one vote for the contestant.

The five contestants in both divisions, fraternity and independent, receiving the highest number of penny votes and Ugly Man parade votes will be eligible for the final skits to be held at 7:30 p.m. Friday in Schwab Auditorium.

The Ugly Man parade will start at 6 p.m. Tuesday. The contestants, accompanied by costumed coeds, will march through campus trying to convince the judges and the crowds of spectators that they are the most horrible looking creatures ever seen.

APhiO will donate half the Ugly Man proceeds to the Stone Valley recreation project. The other half will be used for the fraternity's service projects, which include a bloodmobile, scouting movements and keep-off-the-grass signs.

The Rev. John S. Duley, director of the Westminster Foundation, will speak at the Protestant service at 9 a.m. tomorrow in the Helen Eakin Eisenhower Chapel. # Vanderbilt Prof Will Speak At Chapel Service Tomorrow

Dr. Roger L. Shinn, professor of Christian ethics at Vanderbilt University, will speak at the chapel service at 10:55 a.m. tomorrow in Schwab Auditorium.

His topic will be "Saying Good-bye to God."

Chapel choir, directed by Willa C. Taylor, will sing the anthem "Lord, Thou Hast Been Our Refuge" by R. Vaughan Williams.

George Ceiga, University organist, will play "Chorale Prelude on St. Anne's" by Hubert Parry, an original composition "Lord, Now May Thy Servant Depart in Peace" as the choral benediction and "Fugue in E Flat Major" by J. S. Bach for the postlude.

Shinn, an ordained minister of the Evangelical and Reformed Church, has served as instructor of philosophy and religion at Union Theological Seminary, professor of philosophy and religion at Heidelberg College and professor of theology at Vanderbilt University.

He received his bachelor of doctor degrees from those three universities. He served in the infantry during World War II and spent several months as a prisoner.

Shinn is the author of "Beyond This Darkness" and "Christianity and the Problem of History."
