

7 Student Councils Will Hold Freshman Voting Next Week

Seven of the 10 student councils will hold elections for freshmen members next week.

All-University Elections Committee has been asked by Inter-College Council Board to run five of the elections. Peter Fishburn, committee chairman, said Alpha Phi Omega, men's national service fraternity, and Gamma Sigma, women's national service sorority, have agreed to help at the polls. The 10 councils and their election procedures are:

Agriculture — Elections are held in the spring semester, with one council seat given to each club in the college.

Business Administration — Self-nominations are being held this week in 120 Boucke. The deadline is noon Saturday. Elections for the five freshman seats will be held Oct. 30 and 31 at a booth in the Hetzel Union Building and in 101 Boucke.

Chemistry - Physics — Self-nominations are being held this week in the University laboratories and in the HUB, with 5 p.m. Saturday set as the deadline. The four council seats to be filled in-

chemical engineering with a minimum 2.0 All-University average, a freshman in chemical engineering, a freshman in pre-medicine, and a freshman in science, chemistry or physics. Voting will be held Oct. 30 and 31 in the HUB and in the lobby of Osmond.

Division of Counseling — About 50 students nominated include one for a sophomore in themselves for seats in the council, formed this semester by ICCB. Elections will be held Oct. 30 and 31 in the HUB.

Education — The deadline for self-nominations is noon Friday. Seven freshmen will be elected Oct. 30 and 31 at booths in the HUB and in front of Schwab, or in the lobby of Schwab in case of rainy weather.

Engineering and Architecture — Elections were to be held next week, but have been postponed one week because of the wave of respiratory illnesses. Self-nominations will be held next week in the department office. Second-semester freshmen must have a minimum 2.2 All-University average to be nominated. Elections

will be held Nov. 5 in the Engineering 1 orientation lectures.

Home Economics — Self-nominations are being held this week in the lobby of the Home Economics Building. Candidates must submit a photograph and a list of high school activities. Five freshman seats will be filled in the election Oct. 30 and 31 in the HUB and the home economics lobby.

Liberal Arts — All first-semester freshmen, and second-semester students with minimum 2.5 averages are eligible to nominate themselves for the six seats to be filled. Nominations are being held this week in 132 Sparks, with 5 p.m. Friday the deadline. Elections will be held Oct. 30 and 31 in the HUB and in the lobby of Sparks.

Mineral Industries — About 20 freshmen have nominated themselves as candidates for the two seats open. Elections will be Oct. 29 in the Mineral Industries 1 lecture.

Physical Education and Athletics — Elections were begun yesterday and will continue today for the two seats, one for a boy and the other for a girl.
