

# Circa Gets \$300 Aid In 2d Visit to Cabinet

Circa, new campus literary magazine, was given \$300 last night by All-University Cabinet in partial support of its operating expenses for this year.

Cabinet last week turned down a request for \$500 from Robert Nurock, Circa editor. Members suggested he refer the request to the Artists Series committee, but implied he could return to Cabinet with the project if the committee could not provide the necessary money.

Explaining Circa's return bid to Cabinet, All-University President Robert Steele said the Artists Series committee agreed earlier this week to give Circa \$200, but it could not provide the remaining \$300. The committee assured Steele and Nurock that Circa's finances would be included in their budget next year.

Nurock said if the first issue of Circa in December is not solvent, Cabinet will get back as much money as Circa's treasury can afford.

He expressed optimism for Circa's success in saying more manuscripts have been received this year than ever before.

In other action, Steele announced that the Senate Subcommittee on Student Affairs passed a regulation Oct. 3 requiring the establishment of an activities file in 202 Hetzel Union.

According to the regulation, he said, all campus groups and activities, excluding fraternities and sororities, must submit copies of their constitutions and by-laws for this file by Dec. 16.

Records of membership, committee chairmen and meetings are to be included in the files, which must be brought up to date at the beginning of each semester.

Finances of all activities are to be handled through the office of Associated Student Activities in the HUB or by a certified public accountant, according to the Senate ruling.

Cabinet unanimously accepted the Communication and Culture Workshop report from Student Encampment, which recommended an investigation be made of AM facilities for campus radio station WDFM.

The recommendation asked that AM facilities be included in the 1958 class gift suggestions—if the committee arrived at a favorable conclusion.

This section was deleted from the report when Thomas Hollander, senior class president, explained that gift suggestions were taken from a student vote so the suggestion would have to come from the expressed desire of the seniors and could not be inserted in the final selections at Cabinet's will.

The Senate, which is similar to All-University Cabinet, will seek faculty and state legislative action to eliminate the military training, which, as at the University, is compulsory to all Wisconsin male students for a two-year period.

Don Hoffman, senate president, said the action was taken because "ROTC is contrary to the established principles of democratic education at the University." He said the students should be free to choose their courses.

The Wisconsin University resolution said that compulsory military training is no longer needed. But it would require an act of the state legislature to change the system at Wisconsin.

Several reasons were cited by university members for the dropping of the military training program. One student felt that ROTC was a waste of money while another student said he cannot see where a "left face" or "polished brass" can contribute to his education.

Senate president Hoffman charged "ROTC does not permit students to promote independent thought."

## Army Camouflage May Fool Cadets

Reserve Officers Training Corps cadets must now have a more discerning eye when trying to spot Army officers dressed in their new winter uniforms.

The new uniforms resemble the green outfits which upperclass cadets have been wearing for the last year. Green has been the traditional army color since Revolutionary War days.

# Fadiman Criticizes School Curriculums

Schools and colleges are adding to their curriculums too many subjects that can and should be learned by experience, according to Clifton Fadiman, radio and television entertainer.

Fadiman spoke to 60 persons attending a conference Wednesday night at the Nittany Lion Inn on educational

television sponsored by the Fund for the Advancement of Education, the educational division of the Ford Foundation.

Fadiman said too many educational programs do not teach a student to think, when they should be the most interesting and challenging part of a student's day.

There is no need to make school a place for seeking enjoyment since there is time for this during adulthood, he said. "Children respect the school that makes it necessary for them to work for their learning."

"No one was ever educated by a curriculum," he said. "Students are educated only by inspiring teachers."

Fadiman said an advantage of using television in teaching is that more students can benefit from teaching by a superior teacher. Other teachers also are given more time and energy to advance themselves since they do not have to teach as many classes if television teaching is used, he said.

He predicted that the American public in the future will spend more for education by television than for the other methods of education now in use.

Fadiman said he believes commercial television stations will follow educators in deciding what to do about educational programs. "They are looking to our educators to provide educational television for their stations," he said. On their own, they may be expected to do little more than that required by the Federal Communications Commission.
