(Continued from page one) and making periodic reports to the faculty on the honors work being done, and waiving graduation requirements when necessary to provide for desirable honors work.

•The committee shall consist of five members representing various areas of the college.

•Every department wishing to start an honors program shall submit a tentative program to the honors committee on or before March 1. Accepted programs will be begun in September 1958.

•The words "with Honors," "with High Honors" or "with Highest Honors" (in the major subject) shall be included on the diploma of each student graduating with departmental honors.

•A student must have a 3.0 All-University average at the end of the sophomore or junior year in order to be eligible for honors work. An average of 3.0 in all non-major subjects and a higher average in the major subject must be maintained by all students in the honors program.

A special numerical reference shall be reserved in the University catalog for honors work.

The recommendation of specific averages necessary to graduate with honors, with high honors or with highest honors was referred back to the honors committee for

further discussion. Many of the faculty members felt that these averages were not quite fair to students.

The committee recommended that a student have a 3.5 average in order to graduate with honors; over 3.5 and under 4.0 to graduate with high honors; and 4.0 in the major in order to graduate with highest honors.

(Continued from page one) ship solely for the use of NSA's student government information service.

A fifth reason for discontinuance was not included in the written report: that the University was "not ready" for NSA.

All four delegates—David Allison, Edwin Henrie, Thomas Hollander and Nurock—felt that two conditions must be present before the University will be ready for NSA: the student body must be educated and more orientated to NSA and the students must show their desire and enthusiasm for membership.

Nurock, moving for further study, stressed the need for students to become interested in the international, national and local communities and said NSA would be a good organization through which students can expand their thinking.

Joseph Boehret, All-University secretary-treasurer, angrily denounced the idea that students in any way need NSA to broaden their scope. He said, "By dropping NSA, we are not making our-

selves look like practical little conformists in grey flannel suits." The NSA question has almost become what James Stratton described last night as "a semi-annual issue" for Cabinet.

This "semi-annual" nature of NSA was what some speakers

against Nurock's further-study motion said they wanted to avoid. They said they wanted Cabinet to be rid of the question and agreed with other opposers of the motion that students must demonstrate their enthusiasm for membership.

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
