

West Halls Votes Against Rotation

The West Halls Council has gone on the record as favoring the abolishment of the fraternity-independent rotation system for electing All-University and class officers.

The council thus became the second independent organization to vote for abolition of the system.

The vote Monday night was 16-3 in favor of the abolition. Robert Owens, president of Pollock Council, told council members the system is undemocratic and doesn't parallel the national form of government. He said abolition of the system would bring about a stronger student

government and would rid the campus of student apathy.

According to Owens abolition of the rotation system would encourage the independents to organize and attain greater unity, strength and voting power.

Nittany Council is the only other independent council to vote in favor of abolishing the system.

The Association of Independent Men and Town Independent Men voted to retain it. Pollock Council has not yet voted.

A study of the feasibility of discarding the rotation system was proposed at Student Encampment. A subcommittee of the All-University Elections Committee is making such a study. The committee plans to make its report some-

time in December.

The council also will investigate complaints about the phone system from the University to residence halls.

The subject of improvement of the music broadcast during meals in Waring dining halls was referred to a committee.

A Fireside Committee was appointed to organize a program of outside speakers for the West Halls. William Pohts, senior in electrical engineering from Rosito, was named chairman.

A letter was read from William B. Crafts, assistant to the dean of men for independent affairs, asking the council to set up a budget. The council also heard an offer from Alpha Phi Omega, national men's service fraternity, to assist in projects throughout the year.

3 Jamaicans To Give Talk

Eithel Evans, Leroy Richards and Renford Shirley, special students in agriculture from Jamaica, will discuss the socio-economic problems of Jamaica at an organizational meeting of the World Agricultural Service Society at 7:30 tonight in 218 Hetzel Union.

The WASS was formed to help students in agriculture who are interested in working in foreign countries. Jobs are available only to graduate students experienced in every phase of agriculture.

First-hand reports on the problems of foreign countries will be given at the monthly meetings by students from those countries in order to develop leadership in promoting international understanding.

Douay Bible Given To Chapel Library

The Laymen's National Committee has presented a Douay-Confraternity version of the Bible to the inter-religious library of the Helen Eakin Eisenhower Chapel.

The committee is a non-sectarian corporation founded in 1940. Its purpose is "to re-awaken religious thinking and promote a better understanding among all people."

The Bible is on display in the library. It was given in connection with National Bible week, begun in 1941 by the committee.

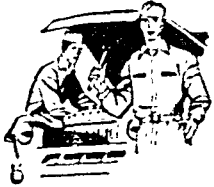
