

Schwab Seat Installation Planned for Christmas

Audiences in Schwab Auditorium should be much more comfortable after the Christmas-New Year's vacation.

The modern upholstered seats to be installed throughout the auditorium will have to be done during the Christmas-New Year's vacation or another similar period when there are no classes, according to Walter H. Wiegand, director of the physical plant.

Wiegand said the new seats will be modern auditorium style, both the back and seat upholstered with a nylon fabric. The upholstery will be green and the trim and metal part of the seat will be yellow. Dr. Albert Christ-Janer, director of the School of the Arts, assisted in the color scheme selection.

The American Seating Company has been awarded the contract for the project. Plans for the new seating were laid during the summer and the contract was awarded earlier this month.

Wiegand said sufficient funds are not available for complete redecoration of the auditorium or the purchase of new drapes. General funds will be used for purchase of the seats.

Wiegand said University workmen will remove the old seats and also many of the "mushroom" ventilators on the floor. This work is not included in the general contract for the seat installation.

Tennis Area In Nittany Open Today

Eight new tennis courts, latest addition to the Nittany-Pollock area recreation facilities, will be opened for action today.

Paul W. Pierson, assistant to the head of the division of landscape construction and maintenance, said the courts are ready for play, although several minor jobs are yet to be completed.

Pierson said steps have to be installed between the court levels. The courts are arranged in pairs along Entrance Road.

Several trees and some shrubbery will be planted between the courts and Entrance Road. The trees and shrubs will serve as buffers for noise coming from the courts.

Work on the tennis courts was begun in May. They originally were scheduled to be opened by the beginning of the semester.

The new courts are similar to those located at Beaver Field. They will also be used for physical education classes. A special 10-foot wall has been built as a backstop for the two north courts. The wall also will be used for special instruction.

amounts, and therefore recommend that a commission be established to set up a University check-cashing service. Insurance program— We propose that the student government recommend to the University that a University-sponsored student insurance plan be initiated to provide additional accident and illness coverage for students.

• Toward promotion of educational freedom: Reserve officers' training program— We feel that while a program of military training has undeniable merits, mandatory participation definitely involves a curtailment of educational freedom. Therefore, military courses should be elective in accordance with the interpretation of the Morrill Act by the United States Attorney General, which states that while military training must be offered to the students of a land-grant institution, it need not be mandatory.
