

Health Center Effort Praised by Walker

President Eric A. Walker has expressed public thanks to Dr. Herbert R. Glenn and the Health Center for the "united effort" in restoring the campus to normalcy in spite of a wave of respiratory illnesses.

"It was a job well done from start to finish," Dr. Walker said.

He praised the students, faculty and administration for their effort and cooperation. "This campus might easily have been plunged into panic, but cooperative effort all along the line prevented that."

During the wave of illnesses, the Health Center was treating approximately 648 students a day, according to University officials. The Health Center, usually with only 60 beds, also was accommodating about 120 students overnight during the period from October 16-26. Both services were described as "normal" yesterday.

Glenn said "a recurrence is always possible but we're hoping there'll be none."

During the peak period of illnesses, Glenn said, more than 5500 students were given medication at the Health Center. But he said about 2000 of these were call-backs or duplications.

The Health Center enlisted the aid of five local physicians to visit women students in the residence halls. The doctors were Dr. Charles C. Cullen, Dr. Robert L. Hall, Dr. William L. Welch and Dr. Edward West. Dr. George M. Mott, on leave of absence, also volunteered to return for the duration of the sick wave.

Glenn praised highly his own staff of doctors and nurses and other assistants. He said they worked uncomplainingly and rendered the University community "a distinct service."

Glenn also praised Robert C. Proffitt, director of food service; Otto E. Mueller, director of housing; Frank J. Simes, dean of men; Pearl O. Weston, dean of women; Alpha Phi Omega, national service fraternity; residence hall hostesses and counselors and the student body. He said he appreciated "the kind and understanding way in which they responded to our needs during this crisis."

Ninety-nine freshmen in liberal arts, or 16.5 per cent of the class, voted in the Liberal Arts Student Council Elections. Robert Nurock, council president, declined to comment on the turnout.

Michael Walker, president of Business Administration Student Council, called the voting turnout "bad." Sixteen per cent of the freshmen in the college voted.

"I have no idea what caused the poor turnout," he said. "We had the voting booths in good places." Last fall's elections had 50 per cent of the business administration voting.

The five freshmen elected to the council were Carol Cohen, Pat Boyle, Floyd Greer, Lucile Sharp and Joyce Carson.

Eleven per cent of the freshmen in the College of Education voted. Last fall's turnout was 50 per cent.

Elected to council seats were Orma Struble, business education; Sandra Homer, music education; Sally Fowler, psychology; James Hoffman, vocational and industrial education; Jackie Long, Elsa Lorange, Andrea Marron, and Jo-

anne Rocco, a four-way tie for the elementary education seat; and Carolina Matz and Vivian Semko, a tie for the secondary education seat.

Voting in the Engineering and Architecture Student Council elections will be held Nov. 5 in the Engineering 1 orientation lectures. The deadline for self-nominations is today. They may be made in the department office.

Traffic Court found a student guilty of his fifth violation Monday night and ordered him to send his automobile home for a period of 16 weeks.

Twelve students were fined a total of \$101. A breakdown shows \$28 for traffic violations, \$8 for failure to report to campus patrol office within the next complete school day and \$65 for failure to register and display a registration sticker.

Nine students who failed to appear before the court were automatically fined a total of \$27. These fines included \$9 for traffic violations, \$3 for failure to report to campus patrol office and \$15 for failure to register an automobile.

Four students had \$6 in fines suspended while 11 cases were dismissed. Three other students had part of their fines, amounting to \$32, dismissed.

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
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


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
