# 10 University Officials Vie In Elections

Ten members of the University faculty and administration will seek precinct and borough offices in the general election today.

Roy D. Anthony, professor emeritus of pomology, Republican, and Leonard A. Doggett, professor emeritus of electrical engineering, Democrat, will seek the office of burgess.

Edith H. Anderson, assistant to the dean of women; Charles F. LeeDecker, associate professor of political science and Lawrence J. Perez, assistant dean of the College of Engineering and Architecture, will seek the Borough Council positions. Mrs. Anderson is running on the Democratic ticket and LeeDecker and Perez are on the Republican ticket.

Rav V. Watkins, scheduling officer, will seek the borough school directorship. He is running on the Republican ticket.

Robert F. Beam, assistant director of the Penn State Foundation, is running for judge of election in the north precinct on the Republican ticket. Joseph H. Britton, associate professor of child development and family relations, is running for inspector of election in the north precinct on the Democratic ticket.

Barton L. Jenks, associate professor of mechanical engineering, is running for judge of election in the east precinct on the Democratic ticket. John F. Bleich, stock room supervisor, is running for inspector of election in the west central precinct on the Republican ticket.

# Christian Scientist Explains Power of God in Healing

Scientific spiritual healing cannot be achieved until the nothingness of matter is understood and the supreme power of God accepted, according to Mrs. Claire Rauthe.

Mrs. Rauthe, a member of the Christian Science Board of Lectureship of the Mother Church, the First Church of Christ Scientist, Boston, spoke Thursday on "Christian Science: The Revelation of Scientific Spiritual Healing."

"The human mind is not a factor in such healing," she said. "It is the eternal Christ who destroys false beliefs who heals."

She said that Christian Science differentiates between an eternal Christ who never experienced crucifixion or resurrection and the human man Jesus who experienced these things.

The human man Jesus left no definite rule for healing beyond his example, she said.

"When the time came, when through spiritual evolution the human consciousness was made

ready, the science of metaphysical healing was founded," she said.

She said the founder of this science was Mary Baker Eddy, who began The Christian Science Church.

The founder hoped her science would be accepted universally by the Christian church, she said, but when this did not happen, she founded the Mother Church of The First Church of Christ, Scientist, Boston.

Mrs. Rauthe said the metaphysical belief in healing is "opposed to hypnosis, will power and mental suggestion."

"Healing is based on a deep conviction in the allness and perfection of God," she said. "It is believing that God knows no sickness or evil."

The bonus questions—Should \$150 million be borrowed to help pay a bonus of up to \$500 to Pennsylvania veterans of the Korean War?—will affect all those veterans who served any amount of active duty time between June 25, 1950, and July 27, 1953, the dates of Korean fighting.

The questions have the support of both Democrats and Republicans.

Throughout the state, the election picture is focused on candidates for mayors, district attorneys, judges, magistrates, councilmen and thousands of minor posts.

Among the mayors to be chosen are those in Pittsburgh, Scranton and 21 of the state's 47 third class cities.

The Associated Press estimated half, or less, of the state's eligible 5,333,006 voters will turn up at the polls today.

The polls open at 7 a.m. and close at 8 p.m.

Elsewhere in the nation, New Jersey and Virginia will elect governors and legislatures and Kentucky will elect a legislature.

More than 75 cities will elect mayors.

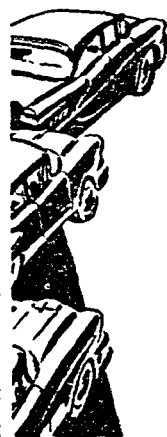

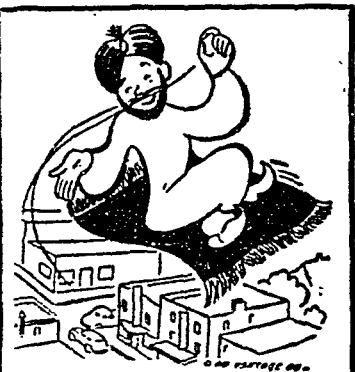
