# Condition Of Sharp Stays Same

George "Larry" Sharp, of Drexel Hill, who broke his neck Oct. 11 on a trampoline in Recreation Hall, still remains in a "guarded" condition in Geisinger Memorial Hospital, Danville.

Sharp, who has been paralyzed from the neck down since the accident, has officially withdrawn from the University. He was a second semester freshman in the division of counseling.

Dr. Alfred H. Greiss, of the University Health Center, who receives reports on Sharp's condition every other day, said the student will remain in the Danville hospital for at least five or six more weeks. His injury is listed as a "fracture-dislocation of the seventh cervical vertebra in the neck."

Greiss said Sharp is not undergoing any special treatment as doctors are waiting to see whether the spinal cord function will return.

When Sharp is released from the hospital, Greiss said he will probably be taken to one of the state's rehabilitation centers.

The student was injured during a physical education class. He was practicing somersaults when he fell into the middle of the trampoline.

# Student Involved In \$1400 Collision

Damage totaling \$1400 resulted when the cars of a student and a professor collided at 5:30 p.m. yesterday at College Avenue and Barnard Street.

State College police are investigating the collision between the vehicles of James Caldwell, senior in meteorology from Punxsutawney, and Wayne Webb, professor of physics. Both were injured slightly.

# 3 Frosh Placed on Probation For Throwing Firecrackers

Three freshmen have been placed on disciplinary probation for the rest of the semester by the Senate sub-committee on disciplinary action, after they admitted throwing firecrackers on campus.

The sub-committee accepted a recommendation of the Association of Independent Men Judicial Board of Review with the exception that the students be permitted to petition for removal of the action from their University records at the end of their third semester.

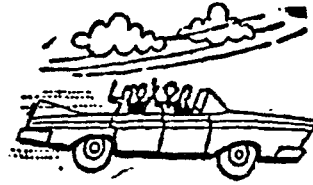
JBR recommended that the students be permitted to petition off the action at the end of their eighth semester.

Two of the students admitted throwing firecrackers down a stairwell in Jordan Hall. The third student said he exploded a fire-cracker in Waring North Dining Hall.

Judicial probation recommended by JBR was upheld by the dean of men's office for two other students who took part in the incident in Jordan Hall but did not actually throw any firecrackers.

JBR had recommended the action because, members said, injury might have resulted from the explosions and because the possession or use of firecrackers is against University regulations and illegal according to state law.

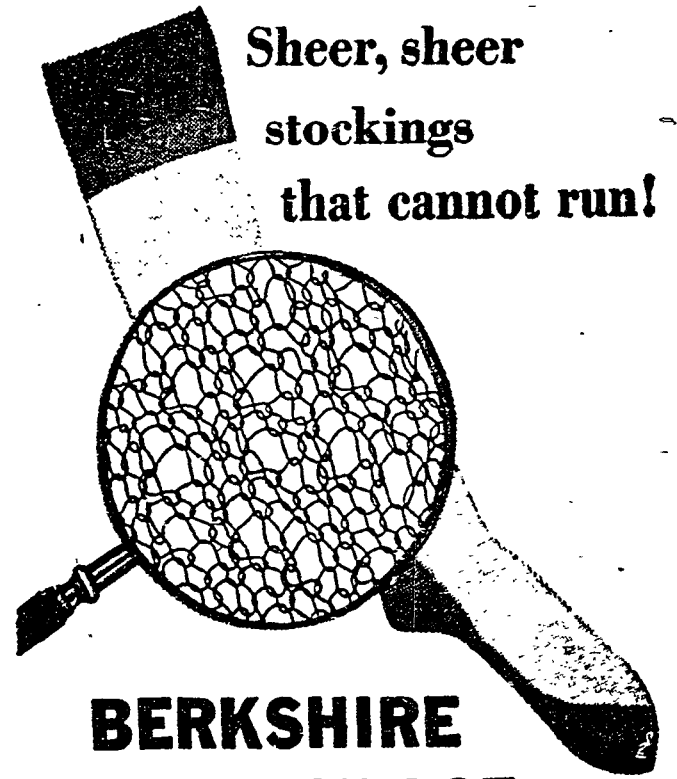
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# IT ALL DEPENDS...
