

Sororities Pledge 193 Coeds As Result of Informal Rushing

A total of 193 coeds have pledged sororities as a result of informal rushing, which ended Friday.

Of the 356 coeds that registered for rushing, 160 did not pledge a sorority. Three coeds dropped out of rushing because they felt it was too time consuming.

(Continued from page one) sical plant, a lay advisory committee of businessmen and civic leaders is being formed.

When established, this committee will take its place along with the other two governing bodies of the program: the Committee for Presidents and the four-man Operating Committee.

The Operating Committee is made up of one representative from each of the four member schools. John Mencher is the University's representative on the committee.

A student enrolling in the center who wishes to count his credits toward graduation from the University must state this intention at the time of enrollment. Students who wish to graduate from Elizabethtown or Lebanon Valley may make their decisions after completing 30 credits of work at the center.

Of course, Keller said, any student who wishes to enroll for credits toward graduation from the University must first meet the University's entrance requirements. This is necessary, he said, so that no "back door" will be opened to the University.

The center is self-supporting. Students pay \$18 a credit and there are no operational costs for a physical plant.

When and if a physical plant is begun, Keller said, all financial support for construction and maintenance must come from the residents of Harrisburg.

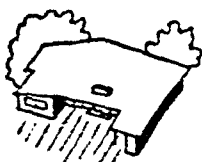

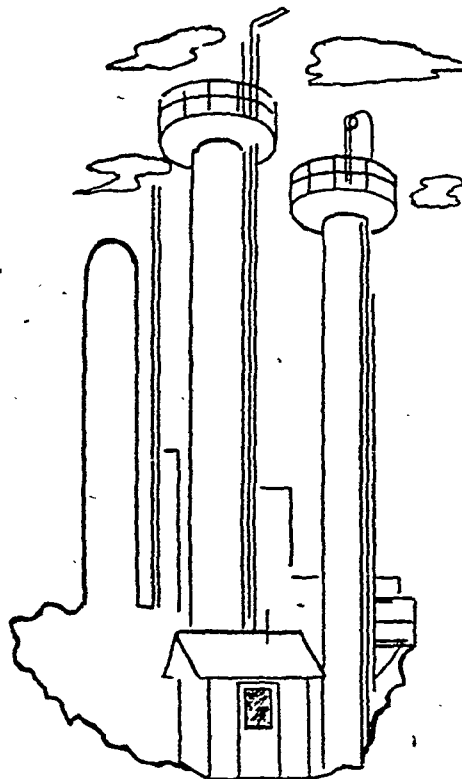
