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Russians—'Laika Come Home'

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7 (AP)—Russia's newest satellite, viewed by thousands in a pre-dawn sweep across American skies, may have split in two.

Scientists at the Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory in Cambridge, Mass., said it is quite possible the elongated, 1,120-pound space vehicle has started to come apart.

They were studying reports from observers in Chicago and Tokyo that the main section of Sputnik II appeared to be trailing a second object. Radio signals on the satellite's 20-megacycle band indicated they might be coming from two separate radio-equipped objects.

U.S. sky observers redoubled their vigilance on the chance that the Russians might try for something spectacular today in honor of the 40th anniversary of the Bolshevik Revolution.

Space Dog Fairs Better Than in Other Satellites

LONDON, Nov. 7 (AP)—Earl Attlee said tonight the dog whirling around the earth in Sputnik II is having as good a time as millions of people in the other kind of Soviet satellite.

"It is fed and kept alive and even has some possibility of escape," the former Socialist premier told the House of Lords.

MOSCOW, Nov. 7 (AP)—Reports circulated in Moscow tonight that the Russians may be trying to parachute spacedog Laika back to earth from Sputnik II.

These reports indicated an announcement might be expected by tomorrow.

Return of the dog to earth would complete a triumph in the saga of the canine-carrying satellite: the roundtrip to outer space. The parachute drop would be the longest ever, of course. The high point of Sputnik II's orbit is 1,056 miles and the low something over 100 miles.

Some Moscow sources speculated the second Soviet satellite was equipped with an automatic device that would eject the dog at a pre-set time. Other theorized she might be ejected when her condition showed signs of deteriorating.

Moscow radio reported earlier Thursday that radio signals still were being received recording the "main physiological functions of the animal."

France May Explode Its 1st Nuclear Weapon

PARIS, Nov. 7 (AP)—Almost unnoticed amid the sustained excitement over Soviet and American arms rivalry, France is believed to be driving quietly toward the day when she will be in a position to explode some sort of nuclear weapon.

U.S. Cold on East-West Talks

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7 (AP)—The United States showed little interest today in Soviet Communist party chief Khrushchev's newest bid for a high-level East-West conference to settle cold war problems.

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
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
