

Penn Prof to Speak On Students' Values

Dr. Philip E. Jacob, professor of political science at the University of Pennsylvania, will speak on "Changing Values in College" at the 10th annual Rufus Jones Lecture at 8 p.m. tomorrow in 121 Sparks.

The talk is a report of his investigations of the change in students' sense of values due to a college education and the merits of this change.

His topic will be "Behold, I Will Tell You a Mystery." The Meditation Chapel Choir will sing the anthem, "Create in Me a Clean Heart," by Bauman. Charlotte Brown, organist for the service, will play the prelude, "In Manus Tuas, Domine," and the postlude, "Gloria Patri," also by Peeters.
