

Stratton States Jobs Facing DOC Council

To establish a constitution and officers, to obtain a satisfactory relationship with the administration and to move into a relationship of the group with the student body:

These are the main jobs facing the newly established Division of Counseling Student Council, according to James Stratton, Mineral Industries Council president.

Stratton, president of the Inter-College Council Board, conducted the council's first organizational meeting last night.

Stratton and Carroll McDonnell, Chem-Phys Council president, told council members how their respective councils are organized and explained some of the activities and programs held by their councils.

Stratton recommended the council establish the offices of president, vice president and secretary-treasurer.

Dr. Robert G. Bernreuter, director of the Division of Counseling, recommended a DOC council at Student Encampment this year. He said the council would aid him in an evaluation of the advantages and disadvantages of DOC.

New D.C. Flight To Land Today At Moshannon

Allegheny Airlines' Washington, D.C., air flight service will land for the first time at the newly-enlarged Black Moshannon Airport at 9:28 a.m. today.

State College, Bellefonte, Clearfield and Philipsburg representatives will take part in ceremonies planned for the landing of the 40-passenger Martin Executive aircraft.

The Washington to Erie to Cleveland flight has flown over the Moshannon airport without stopping since Oct. 28 because the planes had not been able to land on the strip which was only 3000 feet in length.

The strip has been lengthened to 5000 feet. Work on the runways was completed yesterday when the final paving was finished. The work was done by the State Department of Highways in cooperation with the Pennsylvania Aeronautics Commission.

Tokens from area industries will be taken on the flight to Erie and Cleveland mayors.
