

2 Students Recommended For Disciplinary Action

Two students have been recommended for disciplinary action by the Board of Control for their role in creating and circulating a fraternity.

Tribunal consider both cases as evidence of becoming a student at the University. The judicial body refused to release the names of either student.

One of the probation recommendations was given to a sophomore in the Division of Business Administration who admitted creating a fraternity on Oct. 21 from Howard Hall.

The student said he had seen coats similar to the one he had taken and after seeing the coat unattended, he tried it on and it fit. He said that he had no good reason for taking the coat.

The sister of the student who later saw the student wear it and questioned its origin. The student refused the charges.

The student did not admit taking the coat until called into the dean of men's office.

Tribunal's recommendation contained a stipulation that a notification remain on the student's record until his eighth semester.

In the other case, a sophomore in business administration admitted breaking into a fraternity on Oct. 20 and taking several articles of clothing after he had been denied admittance to the house.

The student was at a nearby fraternity party and was persuaded to drop a dog into a pot of boiling water which had been mixed with salt and pepper.

A woman guest at the party became excited and grabbed the dog from the student and ran to the adjoining fraternity with the dog.

The student gave chase and was refused admittance to the house. He said he became angry and thereupon broke into the basement and took the clothing.

He told Tribunal that he later returned the article he had taken.

Both cases will be reviewed Friday by the Senate Subcommittee on Disciplinary Action.

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Senate Subcommittee Reduces ZBT's Social Pro to 10 Weeks

The Senate Subcommittee on Student Affairs yesterday reduced Zeta Beta Tau's social probation to 10 weeks from the sixteen weeks recommended by the Interfraternity Council Board of Control, and added a 6-week Board of Control probation to the penalty.

The Board of Control had recommended the 16-week probation because the fraternity had women in the house Saturday night when the house was not approved by the office of the dean of men.

The Subcommittee also asked the fraternity to request the resignation of Alan Rubens as president of the house, in connection with the unapproved party.

Rubens appealed the board of control's decision at yesterday's meeting, calling it "far too severe under the circumstances."

The 10-week social probation,

which will go into effect immediately, prevents the fraternity from entertaining women guests at any time.

The Board of Control probation, which will go into effect after the social probation, provides that the fraternity be placed under special scrutiny by IFC checkers.
